Town Manager Update : No update

School budget presentation by Judy Kuehn and Diane Saniuk with additional comments from Brian Mullen of the Hull Teachers Assoc.

Budget highlights:

1.

- a) Curriculum assessment using Chalk, an assessment program that aligns with state standards
- b) Keeping as many Special Ed students in-house as possible. Right now 28 are in-house and 17 are out of district
- c) There will be 2 curriculum leaders at the high school specializing in math, history and science
- d) Chromebooks will now be given to 3d graders
- e) Increase early intervention awareness in pre K by going to a full day schedule
- 2. Remedy learning losses due to Covid:
 - a) Provide extra sessions in 6-8 in Social Studies.
 - b) Use substitute teachers to bolster learning losses
 - c) A scholarship program will be used to better reach homebound kids
 - d) Natures Classroom will return this spring
 - e) RMK (Raising Multicultural Kids) will be implemented by using diverse college students to present relevant issues to students in grades K-5
- 3. Esser (Elementary Secondary School Emergency Relief) is a program that provides grants for the many ways of recovering learning losses due to Covid
 - a) Sept. 2022 \$120,000; 2023 \$300,000 (est.) ; 2024 \$900,000

b) The program may be extended past 2024

4. The School Committee may have a decision on school consolidation by May

Presentation on CPC by Tammy Best:

Ms. Best presented a general update assuring the AB that bonding efforts are always ongoing in order to mitigate costs to the town , that Ft. Revere restoration presents few avenues for CPC funding and that the CPC lifetime is always a factor when considering how much bonding debt should be taken on for any project
