REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Selectmen had another busy year in 2011 attending many out of town meetings during the year and participating in regional and state organizations. They also testified numerous times at the State House before the state legislature on matters concerning the town and met regularly with our state senator and state representative. Meetings were also held with department heads, boards and committees and citizens to discuss goals and objectives.

The May election saw a change in the makeup of the board. Dennis A. Blackall chose not to seek reelection. Domenico Sestito was reelected and Kevin Richardson was welcomed as the newest member. At the reorganization meeting John Reilly was elected Chairman of the Board, Christopher Olivieri Vice-Chairman and Kevin Richardson Clerk. Dennis Blackall was thanked for his service to the town and the board wished him well in his future endeavors. He agreed to remain as the Selectmen's designee on the DCR Re-use Committee.

The Board is empowered as the Local Licensing Authority for various licenses and in that capacity collected \$115,390.90 in fees. They are also the Cemetery Commissioners and collected \$37,414.85 for sale of graves and grave openings.

The Board approved a request from Fire Chief Robert Hollingshead who applied for and was granted a \$683,000 personnel grant that would provide funding for the salaries, training, health insurance and other benefits for four additional firefighters for two years.

The regional dispatch center was under construction in Hingham. Four towns, Hingham, Hull, Cohasset and Norwell would join forces in the new center which was funded by a state grant from the state's 911 board.

The board joined with the Town of Hingham to fight the proposed rate increase Aquarion Water was petitioning the Department of Utilities for.

The town was awarded a \$555,000 grant from the Federal Highway Administration to repair and restore the Pemberton commuter boat float and make other infrastructure improvements to the area.

An agreement was made with the Redevelopment Authority to spend up to \$270,000 to enable the town to apply for a \$2.7 million state infrastructure grant which would improve the Surfside area of Nantasket Avenue from Water Street to Anastos Corner. The HRA funds would pay for engineering and other costs associated with the application.

The Board of Selectmen would like to take this opportunity to thank all town employees, volunteers and elected and appointed officials for their contributions towards the effective operation of town government. Special thanks to Phil Lemnios our Town Manager his assistant Nancy Allen, our office staff Janet Bennett and Terri Finneran and our eminently qualified Town Counsel Jim Lampke.

2011 Annual ReportOffice of the Town Manager

I respectfully submit to the citizens of Hull the Year 2011 Annual Report of the Town Manager's Office. The economic conditions that have been battering our shores continued in 2011, although there were signs that the storms ferocity began to diminish. Our ability to maintain our core set of services was still under considerable stress. Additionally we were unable to make any significant headway on a lengthy backlog of capital projects. In spite of these challenges our employees continued to function with a level of resolve that was admirable and a testimony to their spirit of public service.

In January, the presentation of the proposed fiscal year 2012 Budget was made to the Board of Selectmen. The budget presentation kicked off the first stage of the Annual Town Meeting process that culminates in May each year.

The incredibly harsh winter of 2010-2011 began to abate in late February. The cost of snow removal and plowing was considerably high than in the previous year. In addition heating costs for Town buildings were extraordinarily high due to the harsh and prolonged winter season.

The months of March and April were consumed with budget meetings and Town Meeting preparation. The Town Manager and staff met frequently with Advisory Board to review Town Meeting articles and to discuss the implications of various financial and non-financial articles.

In May, Town Meeting approved the FY12 Budget. The FY12 Budget key elements included the following:

EXPENDITURE SUMMARY:

- The FY12 Operational Budget was level funded for the majority of departments. The single and largest exception was the School Department budget that was increased by 2.4% to \$12,800,000. The Operational Budget funds daily activity and does not include elements such as retirement funds, health and property insurance, debt and other non-operational expenditures. There are some increases in various departments to account for negotiated wage increases. On the General Government side of the budget, non- union personnel will receive a wage increase after two years of no increases consistent with the Town's Personnel By-law.
- The General Reserve Fund was level funded at \$50,000.
- The employee health insurance portion of the budget increased by 12% or \$471,383. This cost center continues to increase at a difficult pace to maintain. It should be noted that cost containment measures have been instituted, including increasing the employee share of premiums, higher co-pays for employees, and requiring all retirees, regardless of age to pay the same percentage share of premium costs consistent with State law.
- > Pension costs increased 4% from \$3.02 million dollars to \$3.14 million dollars. This reflects the extent of our obligation in this area as required by state law.

- ➤ Capital Spending: The FY12 budget allocated \$248,572 for capital spending. The plan provided for replacement of two police cruisers, the third year payment for the newly purchased ambulance, funds for a new Fire Department Engine, funds to rehabilitate public works vehicles to extend service longevity, funds for limited seawall repairs.
- The snow removal supplement was funded at \$232,651 for the winter's snow removal activity; an increase \$144,954 over FY11's costs.

In late May, Aquarion Water Company filed for another rate increase, requesting a 23% increase. The residents of Hull already pay some of the highest water charges in the country. Hull agreed to collaborate with Hingham and Cohasset to formulate a focused opposition to the rate case to be held before the State's Department of Public Utilities. Town Counsel James Lampke coordinated Hull's response. The case was scheduled to conclude in April 2012.

As summer began in Hull, residents and visitors all enjoyed our beaches, restaurants and waterfront. The Police and Fire Department helped to ensure the July 4th weekend was safe and enjoyable. Throughout the summer many of Hull's local charitable organizations held variety of charity road races and events. These events were an opportunity for the community to come together to assist worthwhile causes.

Our Public Works employees and summer labor force did a great job cleaning our beaches and maintaining ball fields. Our Board of Health monitored the beaches with weekly water testing to ensure that all swimmers had a great environment to enjoy. They all did a great job.

As fall approached our employees began to prepare for the winter months by making equipment ready and restocking supplies. Additionally, the early stages of the Town's budget and FY13 planning process began to take shape. Additionally, plans were being made for the first "State of the Town" presentation in January 2012.

In December the Town was concluding the final preparations to migrate to the Regional Dispatch Center. The Center involves the Towns of Hingham, Hull, Cohasset and Norwell. Collectively we have received 5.1 million dollars in state grants to build out the center and procure the necessary technology. The Center is the first of its kind in Massachusetts, and will provide for enhanced emergency medical dispatch. Our public safety and IT personnel put forward a tremendous amount of effort to make the new Center a success.

I would like to thank all Town Employees and in particular, Nancy Allen, Janet Bennett and Terry Finneran in the Board of Selectmen/ Town Manager's Office for their tireless assistance throughout the year. It is an honor to serve the residents of Hull. Thank you.

General Property Maintenance Bylaw

Preamble: Recognizing that proper maintenance of property enhances the quality of life in a neighborhood and the town as a whole, and having property properly maintained reduces crime, reduces unhealthy situations for the public and occupants of property, provides a safer location for when public safety and related town personnel must enter the property, helps improve and stabilize property values and is overall beneficial to the public good and welfare, it is declared the public good and need warrants this bylaw.

A All property in he Town of Hull shall be maintained, at a minimum, in accordance with the following property standards:

- (1) General. All property, whether occupied or vacant, Shall be maintained in good repair and in a safe and sanitary condition. They shall be so maintained as to not cause or contribute to the creation of a hazardous condition or lighted areas or as to adversely affect the public health and safety or property value of adjacent or surrounding property. Property must be kept in safe condition such that safety, health and building officials can safely enter the property in the course of their public duties.
- (2) Structures. All structures, including buildings, fences, storage sheds, or any element thereof shall be maintained in a structurally sound condition, free of broken windows and interior and exterior fire hazards. They should be maintained in a condition so as to not cause or contribute to a risk or danger to persons on the property or passers-by or adjoining. neighboring property. Owner shall maintain every building in a manner that is not open to the weather or, if vacant, so secured so as to keep intruders, unauthorized persons or children from entering, using or occupying it.
- (3) Conditions of Land. All real estate shall be maintained free of litter, refuse, garbage, accumulations of vegetation that can create a haven for pest, animals or unhealthy conditions, accumulations of debris, trash or junk or other unsafe conditions that would create an unsafe environment for the occupants, public, neighbors, visitors, passers-by

- or inspection personnel.
- (4) Graffiti. Graffiti is a nuisance to the town and the neighborhood. Owners shall be responsible to remove graffiti from any building or structure within his/her possession or control within fourteen (14) days of it occurring or as directed by code enforcement personnel
- Enforcement and Removal of Nuisance. (5) It is unlawful for the owner of any property in the town to violate the property standards contained in section A. property with one or more violations is hereby declared to be a public nuisance. The Board of Health, the director of Public Health, the Police Chief, the Chief of the Fire Department and the Building Commissioner, and/or their designees and such other employees as designated by the Town Manager, are hereby designated as the enforcing authorities of this If any enforcing authority determines that a violation of the standards described in section (A) exists, he/she shall order the owner to remove or abate the nuisance within ten (10) days after service of notice of the violation. If the violation is such that the public health and safety will be jeopardized by that delay, the enforcing person may order the abatement or removal of the nuisance in a shorter time as the situation may require. The order shall be in writing, and may be served personally on the owner, occupant or his/her authorized agent by any enforcing authority or person authorized to serve civil process.

A failure to comply with the provisions of this bylaw shall be subject to a fine of \$100.00 for each day of non-compliance. These provisions may also be enforced under the town's non-criminal disposition bylaw. Nothing contained herein shall serve as a limit on other lawful enforcement mechanisms, nor shall the same excuse compliance with any other law, rules or regulations.

BAN ON SMOKING ON BEACHES UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF THE TOWN

Section 1 - Preamble: Findings and Intent:

- A. It is the intent of this bylaw to serve and to protect the town's compelling interest to promote and protect the health and safety of the wildlife in our oceans and on our beaches from the ingestion of cigarette and cigar butts that endanger marine and aquatic animals as well as shore birds and other wildlife.
- B. Cigarette butts represent 75-80 of the litter found on the beaches every year as reported by Coastsweep and other beach cleaning organizations.
- C. The leachate from the remnant tobacco

- portion of a cigarette butt is deadlier at smaller concentrations than are the chemicals that leach out of the filter portion of a butt.
- Studies of the problems associated with D. tobacco have established that many cigarette filters are 100 percent nonbiodegradable; it can take a single cigarette more than 15 years to disintegrate naturally. Filters are made up of a plastic compound called cellulose acetate. Cellulose acetate fibers are thinner than sewing thread, white and packed tightly together look like cotton to create a filter. These filters contain many toxic chemicals including acetone, ammonia, arsenic, benzene, benzoapyrene, butane, cadmium, formaldehyde, lead, propylene glycol and turpentine.
- E. Plastic pieces of these filters have been found in the stomachs of fish, birds, whales and other marine creatures that mistake them for food. Ingestion of plastic cigarette filters are a threat to wildlife. According to the Un International Maritime Organization, 177 species of marine animals and 111 species of shorebirds are affected by tobacco litter causing unnecessary malnutrition, starvation and death (Source: California Coastal Commission 2003, Un International Maritime Organization 2001).
- F. Studies conducted by Clean Virginia
 Waterways show that the chemicals in
 cigarette butts easily leach out of the
 butts, and present a biohazard to water
 creatures at concentrations of 0.125 butts
 per liter, or about one butt per two
 gallons of water. According to studies by
 the EPA, one cigarette butt in 2 liters of
 water is also acutely toxic to planktonic
 animals that occupy a critical position I
 the food chain of aquatic ecosystems.

Toxins enter the food chain and wreak havoc with fish, birds and mammals. Marine mammals - like dolphins and porpoises - accumulate the most toxins at the top of the food chain because their bodies contain greater amounts of fat.

- G. The leachate from the remnant tobacco portion of a cigarette butt is deadlier at smaller concentrations than are the chemicals that leach out of the filter portion of a butt.
- H. Recognizing these problems and in an effort to prevent further harm to the public and the environment, many communities throughout the country have restricted smoking in various public areas in their communities.

Section 2. Smoking Prohibited

A. Smoking shall be prohibited on all beach areas under the jurisdiction of the town, including the dunes, ramps, access points and the water up to and including a depth of six (6) feet. "Smoke" or "smoking" means the carrying or smoking of any kind of lighted pipe, cigar, cigarette or any other lighted smoking equipment using or capable for using tobacco, any weed or plant for smoking purposes. Smoke or smoking shall include the burning of any form of tobacco or other combustible material, in a pipe, cigar or a cigarette or any other device used for the burning of tobacco or other similar combustible material, so that the person in possession thereof can inhale and exhale the smoke therefrom.

Section 3. Disposal Prohibited

A. The disposal of an tobacco (including any week or plant used or capable of being used for smoking) or smoking related product on

beach areas under the jurisdiction of the town, including but not limited to the dunes, access points and the water up to and including a depth of six (6) feet is prohibited.

Section 4. Violations

- A. Violations of this law shall be enforced by the Town's Non-Criminal Disposition process c contained in Chapter 1 of the code/Bylaws. Nothing contained herein shall operate to limit any other lawful means of enforcement Including civil enforcement action.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Advisory Board

The Advisory Board submits for your consideration our annual report for the year ending December 31, 2011.

The FY12 budget presented at Town Meeting provided for level funding for General Government and School departments and was balanced. It reflected a 2.02% increase in receipts in expenditures. Projections for FY13 show a Total Receipts increase of only \$600,000 or 1.74%, However, Insurance Costs are projected to decrease \$300,000 which will enable the Town to increase operating department budgets by 4 %.

Last year the Town Manager recommended the transfer of \$592,000 from Free Cash to the Stabilization Account. Town Meeting voted to increase the General Government (Park and Recreation) by \$25,000 and the School Department by \$300,000 and reduce the Free Cash transfer to the Stabilization Account by \$325,000. The Town has historically used monies from the Stabilization Account to support the debt associated with the Memorial School project. FY12 was the first time in 5 years that additional monies had not been used from the Stabilization Account to ensure a balanced budget as required by law. The Stabilization Account balance as of July 1, 2011 was \$646,731 and the remaining Memorial School debt was \$2,975,156.25. The estimated remaining life span on the stabilization fund to support the Memorial School debt is 2.6 years. The Advisory Board agreed with the Town Manager in presenting the FY12 budget in making use of the Free Cash funds to the Stabilization Account. The Advisory Board feels it is in the Town's best to grow the Stabilization Account whenever the opportunity arises. The Town has had to use this account in recent years to ensure a balanced budget required by law. Additionally, the Town authorized a \$600,000 bond in order to purchase and equip a new fire engine and to rehabilitate and make sewer line repairs

We will continue to work with the Town Manager and Board of Selectmen to define our future expenses and revenue needs.

In addition, the department provides community outreach and family support services and nursing services including a wellness component.

Community Outreach and Family Support Services

The Hull Board of Health's Community Outreach and Family Support Services Program, (COFSS), was initially established in September of 2001. It has developed into a comprehensive and dependable information and referral system to assist low income and more recently, middle income individuals, families, children, elders and residents with disabilities to meet their basic needs, and improve their quality of life. The program's mission is to provide Hull residents access to counseling, advocacy and guidance in matters of personal and family concerns. Amongst these are: shelter and housing, transportation, medical/dental and mental health problems, health insurance, SNAP Benefits, (Food Stamps) parenting skills, child management, school-related issues, basic life-skill survival strategies, substance abuse and addictions, domestic violence issues and assistance with financial budgeting for rent and utilities payments, (often in arrears).

During 2011, increases in the volume of aid and assistance rendered to Hull residents were again encountered at COFSS. Dramatic escalation in living expenses, coupled with prolonged or loss of unemployment and homes, have pushed many residents and families to seek out, and if eligible, apply for any and all benefits available to them.

COFSS works closely with local service agencies, police and fire, schools and health clinics, and hospitals and rehabilitation facilities to provide access, recommendations and referrals to, from and also, between, a multitude of state and private non-profit agencies on behalf of Hull residents. Arranging for Fuel Assistance, housing, rent subsidies, Social Security, SNAP benefits, Medicare, the now mandatory MA Health/Commonwealth Care or other health insurance programs and numerous and multiple public aid are a large part of our program. The coordinator continues to attend numerous trainings in order to remain proficient in constantly evolving programs and complex issues such as the state's "Virtual Gateway" Online Application processes; trainings which include legal benefits and appeal processes, Addiction & Substance Dependence Prevention & Treatment, Behavioral & Personality Disorder Identification, and Suicide Interventions.

Referrals to advocates for loan modifications and foreclosures have been added to our centralized resources due to the extreme need of our clients. We have had some degree of success in obtaining direct aid and financial relief for residents by establishing contacts, outreach, and networking with several charitable organizations.

COFSS is often a safety net during the transition to self-sufficiency, a lifeline in escalating economic turmoil or the first and best hope for a family in crisis.

We look forward to continuing to work closely with all town departments and officials during the coming year, remaining grateful for their cooperation and assistance.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Hull:

The Department of Community Development and Planning (CD & P) herewith submits for your consideration its annual report for the year ending December 31, 2011.

The economic problems persisted this year making the work of the Department of Community Development and Planning (CD & P) more difficult but even more important for the future of the Town. The CD & P provides planning, permitting, project development and implementation for many major projects in Town. The CD & P also develops partnerships and secures funding through grants and budget allocations for many Town projects and programs.

These projects and programs represent public/private investment to revitalize this incredible coastal community. There are some fourteen major development projects and opportunities with an estimated value of \$24,000,000 that the CD & P has been involved with last year and the last few years. The CD & P has secured \$1,422,000 for various programs and projects over the last four years. These include social service programs, housing rehabilitation, sidewalk and beach ramp construction, engineering for road rebuilding and public facility reconstruction. We are pleased to report that we successfully appealed the FY10 CDBG grant denial and received a \$330,000 American Reinvestment and Recovery Act grant for the rehabilitation of the Anne M. Scully Senior Center. This was used for site improvements, rebuild kitchens and baths and for electrical work. The project was substantially complete by the end of 2011. The CD & P managed design and construction of this project, and secured and administered its funding.

The CD & P continued to work with the Harbormaster's Department to manage the Pemberton Commuter float project. This includes development of the marine surveyor RFP, construction RFP and liaison with MassDOT and the MBTA. A \$555,000 Federal Highway Grant was applied for and received for the project which will also add a waiting room/restroom facility. Construction is scheduled for 2012. The Department is also working with the Harbormaster on the Nantasket pier dredging project with construction scheduled for 2012.

The Town did not receive the FY11 Community Development Fund (CDF) grant. As in past years the fact that this program awards grant points for regional projects hurt the Town's grant scoring. Regionalism does not make sense for this program in Hull because our peninsula only has two neighboring towns and they are not eligible for this grant. Also towns do not want to partner with us because Hull uses grant funds for staff. As a result we were not awarded the 5 regional points. We worked with the Town's Housing Rehabilitation Advisory Group, the Community Development Advisory Committee, the Board of Selectmen, Representative Bradley and Senator Hedlund to change how points are awarded for regionalism. In response the Department of Housing and Community Development changed the number of regional points from 5 to 2. We hope this will improve our chances for grant award in 2012. The 2012 grant for \$898,761 was submitted in December and includes rehabilitation of 9 residences and the reconstruction of Bay Avenue East.

Although we have reduced hours for administrative staff, the CD & P continued to administer the Community Development Fund (CDF) grant and to monitor and oversee its projects. This included the completion of two additional Housing Rehabilitation projects.

Last year the first project to revitalize the "Waveland" neighborhood, reconstruction of Bay Avenue East, was designed using C.90 funds approved by the Selectmen. The CD & P continues to seek funding for this project and applied to the CDBG program and the new MassWorks program for funds. Staff at MassWorks have been very encouraging and we are now permitting this project to make it more "ready to go". We will also schedule a site visit with their staff and re-submit the application in August at their staff's recommendation. The funding of this project will continue the revitalization of this business district which began with private investment. The project will rebuild the street and add sidewalks and landscaping. However, with government budget cuts and the emphasis on "regional" grants we must work harder to position the Town for funding. We will continue to work to have the projects "ready to go".

The CD & P worked with the Hull Chamber and the Hull Redevelopment Authority (HRA) to begin the revitalization of the "Surfside" business district. Revitalization of this district is the #1 business priority in the Town's Comprehensive Plan. The first project is to rebuild Nantasket Avenue in the area from Water St. to Anastos Corner. The HRA committed \$250,000 for engineering of the project and expended \$50,000 for engineering and administration. The Town provided CD & P services including management, administration and submission of a MassWorks project grant valued at \$3.7 million. MassWorks has been very encouraging to the Town and is giving guidance on how to make the project "ready to go" and how to demonstrate its regional importance. The CD & P will develop and submit permit applications and the MassWorks grant in August 2012. The partnership between the HRA and the Town is critical for this project and for future revitalization of the Town. The HRA has the authority, development tools and revenues to provide the required cash match for revitalization grants.

To improve access to Town the CD & P worked with the Hull Chamber of Commerce, and the Department of Conservation and Recreation to provide a seasonal ferry from Boston to Steamboat Wharf. The service was to be funded with a Congestion Mitigation Air Quality Grant and local match. However, there was only one bid to provide the service and it was withdrawn when fuel prices peaked in the spring. The CD & P supports restoration of this historic ferry service but additional local match may be needed to make it a reality.

The ferry service is part of a comprehensive transportation system for the Town. In pursuing the improvement of our transportation system the CD & P developed a Project Need Form (PNF) for a joint transportation corridor study of George Washington Boulevard/Summer St. This PNF was approved by both the Hull and Hingham Boards of Selectmen this year and will be submitted to Mass Highway in 2012. The goal is to improve public safety, walking and bicycle access, reduce congestion and improve links to transit. A parking program will also be developed for this area.

During the year, the CD & P continued to provide assistance to the Town Manager and the Selectmen on several projects. One of the projects is the Town lease of the DCR Nantasket Beach property for re-development. The CD & P worked with the DCR Re-Use Committee to conduct community workshops to determine a development goal and give guidance to developers for this site. Workshop participants defined the following development goal, "To maximize the Town's commercial tax base by supporting an environmentally and commercially sustainable development model which serves as a catalyst for a successful economy and recognizes that Hull's historic character and natural beauty and resources are fundamental (to success)."

Workshop results were included in the RFP for the project which was advertised but no bids were received. The CD & P continues to work on the development framework for this site and is now focusing on zoning.

The CD & P continues to develop and implement projects and pursue funding that supports revitalization of the year round and destination economies, rehabilitates low-moderate income housing, supports social services and restores infrastructure. Without the dedicated citizens of Hull and the support of elected officials on the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board none of this would be possible. I also want to thank Town employees, the Town Manager and my part time administrative staff, Agnes MacDonald, Hildred Parent and Ellen Barone for their invaluable work this year. Special thanks to Hildred Parent who after many years of great service has stepped down from the administrative position for the Planning Board.

HULL CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT: JANUARY 1, 2011 - DECEMBER 31, 2011

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Hull:

The Hull Conservation Commission hereby submits its Annual Report for the year ending December 31, 2011. The Commission is composed of seven residents appointed to 3-year terms by the Board of Selectmen. Members of the Commission volunteer their time to serve the citizens of Hull by protecting the environment of the town through regulation, education, and environmental planning.

Under the Conservation Commission Act, the Commission is charged with the protection of the community's natural resources. In Hull, our unique natural resources coexist with one of the most densely populated towns in the state. Our beaches, dunes, wetlands, and other unique resource areas provide critical protection to homes, businesses and town infrastructure. These resource areas serve many functions including storm damage protection; flood control; prevention of pollution; and protection of fisheries, shellfish, and wildlife habitat.

The Commission's regulatory role is to administer the state Wetlands Protection Act. Approximately 80% of the land in Hull is covered under the Wetlands Protection Act. For example, all properties in floodplains, near coastal areas, riverbanks, ponds, and wetlands are subject to the Wetlands Protection Act. Any person who plans work that includes digging, filling, grading or otherwise disturbing the ground, should check with the Conservation Commission before work begins to determine whether a permit is needed. Projects ranging from decks, to piers, to single-family homes, fences, driveways, and commercial buildings may require a permit. A major aspect of the Commission's work is to review these projects and, if approved, to establish Orders of Conditions under which work may be conducted in accordance with the Wetlands Protection Act.

COMMISSION ACTIVITIES

In addition to permitting activities, the Commission has continued its efforts at outreach and education for town residents. This year the Commission developed a brochure that explains the Wetlands Protection Act and provides information about enjoying our natural resources. The brochure was included in the light bills that are delivered to all town residents. Additional copies are available at the Conservation Department office in Town Hall. We continue to mail an introduction to the Wetlands Protection Act to all new property owners in Hull. The Commission was active in updating the town's Beach Management Plan. The new plan was approved by the Board of Selectmen in early 2012 and is available on the town website. The plan now includes explanations of natural beach processes and the geology of the beach. We hope residents will enjoy reading it. The Patriot Ledger posted a great short video, based on interviews with participants at the beachgrass planting day, on the importance of beachgrass to protecting the dune. The video can be viewed on the Conservation Department website from the "Saving the dunes in Hull" link.

Other Conservation Department outreach work focused on the predicted impacts of climate change, particularly sea level rise and the increasing frequency and intensity of coastal storms. Conservation Administrator Anne Herbst continued to give her presentation on sea level rise to public audiences, including a meeting of residents from Duxbury, Scituate and Marshfield. With seas rising at the rate of nearly one foot in the last century, and predicted to rise two to four feet in the next century, flooding and storm damage are ever-more important concerns. Our natural resources including salt marshes and our dune and beach system will provide critical protection against rising seas and coastal storms. The Conservation Department submitted two By-Law proposals to Town Meeting in 2011. Town Meeting unanimously approved a By-Law that requires project proponents to address the potential impacts of sea level rise when presenting a proposal to the Planning Board for Site Plan Review. Town Meeting also unanimously approved a By-Law that allows owners of existing properties to request permission from the Zoning Board of Appeals to elevate properties beyond zoning height limits for the purpose of flood protection.

Ongoing work of the Conservation Department includes overseeing the Town's participation in the Community Rating System (CRS) and administering FEMA flood mitigation grants. Through CRS, as a result of the Town's efforts toward flood protection, flood insurance premiums for all property owners in Hull are discounted by 10%. The Town was re-certified for continued participation in the CRS program as of October 1, 2011. The FEMA flood mitigation grants provide owners of previously flood-damaged homes partial reimbursement for the cost of elevating their homes, or utilities within their homes. The town has received two grants for ten homeowners and has an additional application pending.

The Hull Conservation Commission, like most Commissions throughout the Commonwealth, spends much of its time and resources serving the community in its regulatory, rather than conservation capacity. We wish to acknowledge the following associations and committees for the service they contribute to ensure the well being of our natural resources: Beach Management Committee, Straits Pond Watershed Association, Weir River Watershed Association, the Weir River Estuary Park Committee, and the Hull Land Conservation Trust. We also wish to thank the citizens of Hull who, through their care and concern for the environment, are active participants in the stewardship of our beautiful, fragile peninsula. Finally, we wish to thank all of the Town staff for their assistance during the year; their cooperation has been essential to the Conservation Commission operations.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HULL CONTRIBUTORY RETIREMENT SYSTEM

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Hull:

The Contributory Retirement Board submits for your consideration their annual report for the year ended December 31, 2011.

The Hull Contributory Retirement System, having accepted the provisions of Section 1 through 28, under Chapter 32 of the Massachusetts General Laws, is one of 105 contributory retirement systems within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, operating independently, however bound by one uniform retirement law. The administrator and governing authority is the Retirement Board. The Board consists of five-members:

<u>Ex Officio Member</u>: A member by virtue of office, currently the Town Accountant <u>Two elected members</u>: Each is either an employee or a retiree within the system, and is elected by the employees and retirees

Appointed member: Chosen by the Board of Selectmen

<u>Fifth Member</u>: Chosen by the other four members and cannot be an employee, retiree or official of the Town

All Board meetings are open to the public and are generally held on the fourth Tuesday of each month at 9:00 am in the Louis C. Costa meeting room in Town Hall.

The retirement system covers all town employees and certain school employees working more than 20 hours per week, as well as any employees of the Hull Housing Authority. A retirement benefit is available to the members of the system after at least 10 years of employment and after reaching age 55. As of December 31, 2011, there were 187 active members, including 16 members added in 2011, and 135 retired, beneficiary and survivor members.

The December 31, 2011asset balance was \$26.6 million, \$4.6 million in total receipts, including the Town and Hull Housing Authority appropriation of \$3,020,137.00, plus current member contributions totaling \$846,694.84. There was \$3.7 million in disbursements, of which \$3,297,329.83 was retirement benefits paid to retirees and beneficiaries, inclusive of a 3% cost of living adjustment effective July 1, 2011, plus an additional \$119,262.20 for retirement benefits paid to retirees of other systems, \$70,838.36 for member refunds and transfers, and \$130,063.36 in administrative expenses, inclusive of investment management expenses. As of January 1, 2005, the assets have been fully invested with the Massachusetts Pension Reserves Investment Trust (PRIT) Fund.

The system is monitored and reviewed by the Public Employee Retirement Administration Commission (PERAC) for compliance with all areas of MGL Chapter 32. They provide service to the Board, members and retirees, as well as oversight duties. To them, the Board must submit a comprehensive annual report regarding the financial condition of the system, including a full and correct exhibit of all assets, liabilities, income and disbursements, of any changes in fund balances, and of the conditions and affairs of the system. This report is available to the public upon request. The Commission also approves all retirement allowances, coordinates the disability retirement process providing the final approval, monitors the post retirement disability process, audits the system for all operational and financial activities, and provides educational and legal support to the system and the members.

This January, as with every January, the Board re-organized as follows: Marcia Bohinc, Chairperson, Leonard Colten, Vice Chair, and Brian Thompson, Secretary.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen, Town Manager and Citizens of the Town of Hull: The Council on Aging submits for your consideration its annual report for the year ending December 31, 2011.

The Council on Aging is a municipally appointed, volunteer board authorized under M.G.L. Chapter 40, section 8b. The Council's major responsibilities include the setting of local policy for the administration of elder programs and services; developing, coordinating and/or conducting such activities; serving as an advocate for elders; and educating the community-at-large about the needs and resources affecting their lives.

Barbara Lawlor, Director, manages the office of the Council on Aging, at the Anne M. Scully Senior Center. Full-time staff includes: Jo Ann Rose-Assistant. Part-time staff includes: Ann Kenney-Outreach Worker; Donna Gagne-Transportation Driver, Formula Grant financed Mary Jordan-Receptionist; South Shore Elder Services' Nutrition Manager, Mary Nugent, also available Margaret Mellon-SHINE Counselor at Wellspring. We also have Lou Gainor who represents the Council on Aging on the South Shore Elder Services board of directors.

The Senior Center is a very active focal point of the Community where we plan programs and activities, schedule transportation, answer thousands of questions posted by the seniors and their families. We also have over 39 senior volunteers who provide help daily including; driving our vans, answering telephones, running activities, entertaining, teaching crafts, shoveling walks or mowing the lawns and trimming bushes, doing small repairs, setting up for activities, setting up trips, serving meals & cleaning up, just to mention just a few of the jobs provided by these wonderful people. We have had another 9 teenage volunteers visiting with seniors, playing Wii, or offering cleaning or yard work around the center. These volunteers donate over 11,100 hours during the year, equaling a total dollar amount of over \$121,500.

These past few years have been a particularly tough time financially for seniors <u>and</u> their families. 2011 began the largest population turning age 65 years old **ever** and this will last through the next ten years; this population is fondly referred to as "The Baby Boomers". The increase in questions concerning social security, health plans, fuel assistance, food assistance, etc, has begun. This is a generation expecting services. As the census will show, the over 60 population in Hull has grown. These residents have been looking for senior programs and will need assistance as soon as today. The COA needs to be prepared. Everyone feels the financial crunch, but consider being on a fixed income and not being physically capable to supplement that income.

One of the more important volunteer positions we provide is that of the SHINE counselor who works very hard helping people to apply and understand their medical coverage. With all the changes between Medicare, Medicaid, Prescription Part D, Prescription Advantage, and a personal care providers, the elders need an advocate to break down the 400 page medical booklets to language they can understand and help set up the right program per individual. Over the course of the year we have helped 167 people with their medical and prescription drug inquiries. We thank Margaret Mellon and Ann Walsh of Wellspring for support with these and food assistance inquiries.

Since the beginning of October the Outreach Counselor has assisted 87 clients in obtaining, renewing, or inquiring on status of fuel assistance through South Shore Community Action Council. This requires numerous phone calls with clients, SSCAC, the final application assistance and follow-up in the office. There have been 3

cases of finding oil for immediate emergency fill-ups. In some cases it required researching and finding additional funds and/or oil for clients that had either used up their dollar allotment for the season or never applied because they couldn't believe they could be in this financial situation. Fuel application assistance is available for town wide residents of every age.

All staff members of the Senior Center are ready to answer any questions posed or provide a helpful hand at any request. We all provide outreach, whether it is information, resources, a kind ear, or helpful advice. We hold no discrimination of age; you may be younger than a senior, disabled, or a family member needing support or guidance. If we can't help you, we will do our best to point you in the right direction. We have many resources available to us and we will not hesitate use them.

Our vans transport hundreds of rides *per month.* Please note; when budgeted funds run out, funds to maintain our vans come from the <u>private donations</u> given to the Senior Center by town residents. The greatest number of transports is the patron that utilizes the Senior Center as their daily routine. Morning socialization, lunch and other activities are offered daily. Recreation programs include: Mon. & Wed. morning exercise class, bingo on two Monday afternoons each month, Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday afternoons are our various card clubs & Mahjong, we provide refreshments mid-afternoon for anyone attending. Tuesday mornings we may have craft projects or games. Tuesday & Thursday mornings are Yoga classes. All are welcome for morning coffee, pastries, and socialization. Our Center is open at 9 A.M. Monday through Thursday, and van pickups begin at 9. Throughout the year a total of: 1679 exercised or practiced yoga, 1,250 sat down to play cards, 455 enjoyed Mahjong games, 413 played bingo, 280 went to Foxwoods, over 171 blood pressure checks, 129 pairs of feet checked by Dr. Dwyer-the podiatrist, and 457 sat in vans roundtrip to grocery shopping. These figures include repeat visits by clients.

Just about every month we offer special little day trips such as: the Hanover Mall, Christmas Tree Shop, Dollar Store, luncheons, Foxwoods, etc. There were seasonal social trips; White Mountains-NH weekend trip-30 attended, Glastonbury Abby Cookout & monthly dinners, Bourne Scallop Fest/Cruise 15 attended, Lions Club Holiday Dinner, Salt Water Club Senior Dinner; each year we try to come up with new ideas. In 2012 we will have trips to Lancaster PA, New Hampshire, and we're planning a trip to the Colorado Rockies. The vans run four days a week and we provided approximately 6157 rides to seniors during the year. Figures are down again, not because of necessity because of reduction of the van driver's hours.

One of the vans is used primarily for medical transportation, 114 rides this year. Many have no other means or the finances to make their medical appointments. Our clients appreciate the independence, seniors hate to "put their children out" by asking them to take a day off from work. If the appointment is out of our transportation range, we try to find them transport by other means. Some of our medical trips are provided through a grant with five South Shore area towns where we're contracted with a provider for medical transports. We resourced 11 roundtrips rides to Boston and outskirts.

During 2011 we served over 3700 congregate meals and delivered over 12,600 Meals-on-wheels. These meals are served at the center or they are delivered by some of our many volunteers. For some seniors or disabled this may be their only meal of the day.

Throughout the year we have speakers on timely subjects. Before Election Day, we provide a forum whereby the citizens of Hull can meet and hear the local candidates address current issues at what we Fondly call "The Candidates Coffee Hour".

Other guests of the senior center, Electrical Safety with Ray Gouley, Gigi Mararchi from Rep. Garret Bradley's office, Sandra Dalton from Sen. Robert Hedlund's office, Garden Club-Garden Therapy, Joanne Campbell-Hypnotherapy, Cindy Bittker- Parkinson's Support Group.

Seminars this year include; Mary Hooper Pet Care Program, Taking Care of Yourself & Others, Eating Healthy, Preventing Falls, Holly Harris Legal Checkup, Met Life Senior Needs, Financial Planning, So. Sh. Elder Services

budget planning, SSES Osbudsman, Maureen Coyle Vision Loss Safety, and Insurance Planning. We hosted 15 informational speakers over the year. We had a little Iull over the time of renovations.

More services provided are the monthly blood pressure clinic, a bi-monthly foot clinic, legal counseling, tax preparation, food assistance, and SHINE (health insurance) counseling and Fuel Assistance from November through April, Food Stamp Assistance. Including telephone inquiries, this past year we provided well more than 26,000 services for our many clients. Tax preparation services has grown over this year with so many inquiries and need of assistance to be able to receive the tax stimulus and more are aware of the Circuit Breaker tax return.

We also provide the tax abatement program where twelve seniors will volunteer 100 hours of community service and receive the \$750 tax abatement.

With mounting financial problems destined for our seniors, the Golden News publication has gone from a 4 page publication to 10 or 12. It includes helpful information for anyone on fixed income status, seniors, disabled, & veterans. It contains info about food stamps, fuel assistance, medical, tax info, local programs, trip plans, seminar/presentation dates and so much more. Please call if you wish to receive this in the mail. The Golden News is sent bi-monthly. We write, print, fold, & tape the publication right at our center. Over 6,000 issues were distributed bi-monthly in 2011. We mail 747-792 to seniors and you can find them at the Town Hall, Library, and the Light Co. The Formula Grant program supplements some of the mailing cost of this newsletter. Private donations help to defray the cost of inks, paper, toners, and other supplies.

This year our wish list includes a grant funded new van, computers, and paint & small repairs, to add a finishing touch to the ADA grant work provided by the Community Development. The senior center is fortunate to have been chosen this year for the American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009 by the Department of Housing and Community Development, for American Disabilities Act upgrades to our parking, kitchens, bathrooms, doorways, etc. What a fantastic job, our center looks great. We wish to thank Robert Fultz of Community Development and everyone involved in this project.

We also receive the Formula Grant. This is a small grant that provides funds for the salary of our receptionist, postage, and some supplies.

The Center is used for various town activities throughout the year and there were approximately 10 organizations using the meeting room on the second floor this past year. The Hull Garden Club meets regularly to plan programs and town projects, which help beautify Hull. It also has Garden Therapy enrichment programs for senior citizens. The Hull VFW, Hull Democratic and Republican Town Committees and various town departments, including Community Development, the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Library and other boards have meetings at the Center during the year.

Our past credentials include; in 2001, I became one of the first directors from across the State to be certified by MCOA, the state COA organization. (One of 11 out of a field of 22.) In 2000, we were the recipients of that year Executive Office of Elder Affair's prestigious ROSE Award. As there are 351 cities and towns in the Commonwealth and they award only 3 or 4 of these each year, they are coveted. Also, two years before that, we received the MCOA Senior Center Excellent award.

The government's senior services and aid are "too often" the first to feel the slash in any budget crisis — across the country, the state, and eventually local". The 2010 census will show there are approximately 2 ½ times more seniors in Hull than students. Seniors need services. Donations help sustain this center. We want to express gratitude to ALL our wonderful donators during the year and especially the thoughtful families that have offered the Hull Senior Center as their Memoriam for a loved one. These donations are a necessary and very appreciated.

A special thanks to the Hull DPW, they assist in keeping the center safe and available for the seniors to come to, no matter the bad weather. They were instrumental in our transition during the construction; they moved ALL our equipment, foods and projects into the Jacobs School.

We also wish to thank Kathleen Tyrell, Superintendent of Schools, and her gracious staff, for housing us in the Jacobs School throughout the renovations. They were wonderful and hospitable.

Thank you to our Chairman of the COA, Brian McCarthy, he assisted us through this transition as well as everything he does for us through the year, all the years. He is a tremendous advocate to our senior population.

It has been my pleasure to be Director of this senior center for over 22 years and I am proud to be part of the building of this multi-service meeting place, the Anne Scully Senior Center. Thank you to our Hull Council on Aging members. It is due to our wonderful staff, volunteers and participants that we have received great awards. Our #1 reward is being able to provide for such a wonderful group of Hull citizens. I thank my staff, Mary Jordan, Jo Ann Rose, Donna Gagne, and Ann Kenny for their professional and sincere approach to our clientele, many weeks they exceed their weekly hours to be sure Hull seniors receive their needs.

At this time we would like to thank the Town Manager, Board of Selectmen and all other Town Boards and Departments who have been very supportive of the Council on Aging and the Anne Scully Senior Center over this past year.

2011 ANNUAL REPORT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Hull, I hereby submit the 2011 Annual Report for the Department of Public Works:

The Department of Public Works

The Public Works Department is responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of all municipal roads, sidewalks, stormwater drainage systems, recreation areas, beaches, parks and grounds. We also manage the Town's Landfill, the Straits Pond Watershed Tide Gate, the Village Cemetery, and all public shade trees in Town. We are responsible for snow and ice control on all public roads, ways and sidewalks, and we assist and support other department whenever possible.

We welcome new employee John Twombly who recently returned to "West Corner" and is now working for the DPW in the area he grew up in. I also want to acknowledge and thank Richard Cleverly for all his efforts working as our seasonal/winter mechanic's assistant. John and Richard have proven to be assets to the Department.

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Stormwater Management

The Department of Public Works is responsible for ensuring the Town remains in compliance with the federally mandated National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System General Permit for Stormwater Discharges. We accomplish this by managing and controlling stormwater runoff from public roads and other Town properties, and by tracking private developments to ensure wetland and coastal resource areas are protected from pollution. For more information on stormwater management in the Town of Hull, including what you can do to help, please visit the Town's Website at www.town.hull.ma.us and click on Stormwater Management on the Department of Public Works web page.

In late 2011 we finally began working on the installation of drain lines as part of the Straits Pond/Richards Road Stormwater Improvement Project. This project involved the design and construction of stormwater Best Management Practices (BMP) controls to help address and

alleviate problems associated with nonpoint source pollution in the Straits Pond Watershed. Funded in part by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts under the Federal 319 Nonpoint Source Pollution Grant Program, this project will help the Town with its efforts to improve the water quality of Straits Pond and the Weir River through proper stormwater management.

New Equipment

New equipment purchased in 2011 includes a Ransome AWD triple deck mower for cutting the capped portion of the landfill and recreation fields, and a 7'x 16' Kodiak Haulmark enclosed trailer. The triple deck mower, which when new lists for over \$50,000.00, was purchased used for less that \$10,000.00. The trailer was purchased new, and then set up inside by DPW employees Scott Reynolds and Chris Gardner. Not only will this new trailer improve efficiency by elemininating the need to load and unload mowers and other equipment each day, it will also allow DPW employees to sharpen blades and perform other maintenance activities on-site without returning to the DPW barn.

Reconstruction Projects:

Using contracts awarded under the South Shore Regional Services Consortium, T.L.Edwards cold planed and overlaid Nantasket Avenue, from the Sewer Treatment Plant to Spring Street. Prior to the start of work on the roadway, DPW personnel repaired street drains in the area to improve stormwater runoff. Other roadway work in 2011 was the resurfacing of Atlantic Avenue from Gunrock Beach to Stoney Beach Road as part of the Water Main Replacement Project by Aquarion Water Company.

We continue to advance the design and permitting of the reconstruction and improvement of Atlantic Avenue under the "TIP" program, and were awarded a grant under the Coastal Pollution Remediation Program that helped us fund the evaluation, assessment, and design of water quality improvement, Best Management Practices (BMP's) for stormwater runoff from Atlantic Avenue. We hope to incorporate these BMP's into the reconstruction work. Currently, we are awaiting final comments on the 25% Design Plans and Design Exemption Report. Once this process is completed and Mass Highway conducts the required public hearing for the project, we can advance from the Supplemental TIP Universe of Projects for FY13-16 and be programmed for a specific year.

Highway/Drainage Maintenance and Special Projects

Highway and drainage maintenance activities include the sweeping of all public roads and sidewalks, cleaning of all catch basins and manholes, pothole patching, cleaning of pipes and drainlines, and the regular inspection and assessment of critical stormwater infrastructure systems including seawalls and foreshore structures. We repaired seawalls damaged by Tropical Storm Irene including two areas along Cadish Avenue and one along Nantasket Avenue opposite the Lifesaving Museum. We are currently working with the Fire Department and Light Plant to secure FEMA reimbursement funds for expenses incurred as a result of the storm and damage to seawalls and roadways.

In 2011 we once again had portions of the DPW roof patched and repaired. However, decades of leaks in the roof and masonry walls, settlement of the concrete floors, and antiquated plumbing and ventilation systems all need to be addressed for us to be able to continue to operate in our current building.

Cemetery ·

In 2011 the Department performed 54 interments at the Hull Village Cemetery. Maintenance work includes mowing and trimming during the summer months, snow plowing and sanding of the primary road system during the winter, and maintenance of monument foundations, roadways, drainage, water lines and spigots as required. With panoramic views of Boston Light, Hull and Hingham Bays and the Atlantic Ocean, the cemetery provides a picturesque and tranquil place where family, friends, and mourners can gather to remember lost loved ones. With an average of over fifty interments a year, we are again faced with the need to expand into previously unused areas of the cemetery. We are also looking into the possibility of installing a columbarium to accomadate the increasing appeal of cremation burials.

Beaches, Parks and Grounds

The Department of Public Works maintains a number of recreation areas including ball fields, tennis courts, basketball courts, soccer fields, and playgrounds throughout the Town. We clean the beach of trash and seaweed, and after consultation with the Conservation Commission and Beach Management Committee, maintain the beach openings in the dune along North Nantasket Beach. In addition to our usual annual spring beach grass planting, in November of 2011 we planted 2000 beach grass plugs on the landward side of the dune.

Snow and Ice Controls

Town wide snow plowing operations: (6); Town wide sanding operations: (14); and numerous spot sanding, snow removal and clean up events.

I would like to thank Town Manager Philip Lemnios, the Board of Selectmen, and all the other town departments, boards, and committee members that assisted the Department last year. I would also like to thank Trish Erickson for her efforts in running the DPW office in such an efficient and professional manner, and commend all of the faithful employees and staff of the Department of Public Works for their dedicated service and hard work, which is often performed with minimal resources and under adverse weather conditions.

Honorable Board of Selectmen Town Manager Citizens of Hull

On behalf of the Hull Fire Department and its members, I respectfully submit the 2011 Annual Report, a brief illustration of the Department's most significant accomplishments of the last 12 months.

Every member of our department prides themselves on providing quality fire, rescue and emergency medical services. It is important for the community to understand the realities of a public service organization.

Included within the 2011 Annual Report is information and statistical data from several divisions, which serve as examples of the Department's various and diverse activities, some of which are listed below:

South Shore Regional Communications Center

The towns of Hull, Hingham, Cohasset and Norwell have been leading the way in placing in service the first regional 911 emergency communications center in the state. The Center is being funded through the grant program of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts 911 Commission. The Center provides extensive communications capabilities for all emergencies as part of a multiagency/multijurisdictional plan. The Town of Hull Dispatchers migrated to the SSRECC on January 4, 2012.

Deputy Fire Chief Chris Russo and Firefighter Gary Twombly have been instrumental during the operational and technological transition.

A special thank you to the Hull Dispatchers Kathy Costa, Sandra Russell, Mary Ellen White, Fran Bowler, Danielle Cope-Sullivan, Diane Thomas, Kristin Pederson, and Mary Kate Garrity for their professionalism and service as they become part of the team servicing Hull, Hingham, Norwell and Cohasset.

DCR- Nantasket Beach EMS Program

The Department continued into the third summer season of providing Emergency Medical Services at the Nantasket Beach Reservation. The staffing, provided with funding from the DCR Parking Lot Trust Fund provides supplemental fire department paramedic service during weekends. This service provides for a second Hull Fire Department ambulance to be on detail at the Reservation allowing the primary ambulance to be available for the citizens of Hull.

Citizens Fire Academy

The Citizens Fire Academy took place under the direction of Deputy Chief Chris Russo, with the assistance of Captain Dan Evans and Firefighter Paramedic Bill Frazier. The 15 students, attending six weekly three hour classes, were oriented in numerous Fire Department functions including: department history, administration, fire behavior, protective clothing and breathing apparatus, fire prevention and engine and ladder truck operations.

Peddocks Island-Boston Harbor Island Alliance

The Fire Department has been working with the Boston Harbor Alliance, the DCR and the U.S. Coast Guard in preparation for the expanded services requirements that will be required on the island as the new Visitors Center and other renovations take place. Fire personnel have been involved with inspectional and fire/rescue services on the island as work progresses.

Federal and State Grant Programs:

SAFER

The Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response Grants (SAFER) was created to provide funding directly to fire departments in order to help them increase the number of trained, "front line" firefighters available in their communities. The goal of SAFER is to enhance the local fire departments' abilities to comply with staffing, response and operational standards established by the NFPA and OSHA (NFPA 1710 and/or NFPA 1720 and OSHA 1910.134). The Town of Hull was awarded \$683,817.00 to hire four additional firefighters for a two year period. Firefighter/ Paramedics David Brissenden, Theodore Sapienza, Joseph Welby and Robert Wholley attended the 12 week Massachusetts Firefighting Academy and are actively serving the town.

AFG FEMA Firefighter Safety Grant

The department has been continuing the central fire station renovation project with the grant of \$360,000.00. The project provided for a state of the art fire alarm system and a full sprinkler system. The HVAC was replaced with energy efficient units.

The fire radio system was replaced with a UHF (ultra high frequency) system which improves interoperability with other public safety agencies. All portable and mobile radio units were replaced which enhance firefighter safety. Deputy Chief Russo in conjunction with Judi Saide, the towns' IT Director, the UHF radio system is transmitting over state of the art fiber and simulcast on a microwave link.

Massachusetts SAFE Grant

The Student Awareness of Fire Education (S.A.F.E.) Program is a grant program to local fire departments designed to put trained firefighter-educators in the classroom to conduct life and fire safety education programs in grades Pre-K through 12. The primary mission is to enable students to recognize the dangers of fire and more specifically the fire3 hazards that tobacco products pose. Through the S.A.F.E program, firefighters are able to deliver age-appropriate fire and life safety lessons in close coordination with classroom teachers and health educators. Fire Captain Dan Evans provided fire safety education to all students at the Jacobs Elementary School in grades Pre-K to 5.

"Project Kid Care"

This year marked the 16th Annual "Kid Care Photo ID" program, which continues to provide child safety identification cards. To date, over 4500 children and their families have benefited from the program.

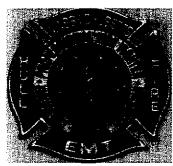

Emergency Medical Services



The Town of Hull Department of Fire/Rescue and Emergency Services, supplies medical care to the residents and seasonal visitors of the community on a daily basis. This task is accomplished with a compliment of 21 Paramedics and 12 Emergency Medical Technicians, who are licensed by the state. Our level of care is dictated by state protocols and an affiliation agreement with South Shore Hospital, which is a Level 2 Trauma Center.

Emergency medicine is an ever-evolving entity. Every year there are changes with the state protocols. Some of these changes also impact the level of care that EMT's can perform. As of March 1, 2012, certain life saving medications have been added to increase their level of efficiency. The state has also raised the level of required training for paramedics, they must now show proof of 12 lead competencies and the list of medications available to them has been modified to better suit the needs of the public. A new program MOLST (Medical Orders for Life Sustaining Treatment), has been initiated by the state. MOLST will allow terminally ill patients to dictate which life sustaining treatment they wish to have in an out of the hospital setting. All of the members of the department have received training to make sure that the patient's wishes are carried out.

Providing EMS plays a major role in the activities of the Fire

Over the past year the department has updated the equipment needed to perform ALS (Advanced Life Support). New monitors have been purchased and medical supplies are replaced and up-dated as needed. The two ambulances require constant maintenance, and are currently scheduled for an annual state inspection in April. All deficiencies from this inspection must be corrected in a timely fashion, and plan of correction is required by the state before the license is issued. The department also has to maintain a Controlled Substance License in accordance with Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 94C, Section 7. A drug log must be maintained and inventoried on a daily basis, to comply with the Department of Health and the Food and Drug Administration.

Our medical responses increase on a monthly basis. We are now seeing a trend towards more than one call at the same time. To the credit of the department, all of these demands have been answered and medical aid has been given in a timely fashion. Many patients are treated, but the majority of them also require a transport to Quincy Medical Center or South Shore Hospital. With the help of our Mutual Aid Agreements with the surrounding towns, we have the ability to supply services on a paramedic level when our ambulance is unavailable.

I would like to extend my gratitude to Chief Hollingshead, Michael Marciello, Kevin Coughlin, James Marcella, Steve Johnson and all the dedicated members of the Hull Fire Department.

The Goal of Fire Prevention

The goal of Fire Prevention is to preserve the safety of our residents and the resources of the community from the effects of fire. This office uses a program of education and code enforcement to meet the needs of this goal. Below are some of the duties that the office of Fire Prevention oversees.

State-Required Inspections:

The Fire Prevention Office, Building Department and the Board of Health conduct all Annual Inspections of Occupancies licensed by the state. Some examples of these inspections are restaurants, daycare centers, rooming and boarding houses and foster homes.

Plan Review for New Construction

To create a proactive system of code enforcement, the Fire Prevention Office and the Building Department work closely reviewing all plans. The obvious advantage of this cooperative relationship is that it enables the Fire Department to raise concerns and point out discrepancies before construction begins. Correcting these problems before the start of construction is the most effective way to ensure the project is compliant and completed in a cost efficient manner.

The Scope of Inspections:

The variety of properties a Fire Prevention Officer is responsible for inspecting is extensive. There are a multitude of codes and hazards that he/she must be familiar with. By working closely with the Building Department, the officer ensures that properties are constructed to provide the occupants with the utmost safety. This is accomplished by reviewing plans and visiting the sites during and after construction. After the building is occupied, he/she regularly inspects the property to ensure that it is being used as it was intended and within the design parameters. Code enforcement is part of the responsibilities of the Fire Prevention Officer. However, a more productive way to ensure the public's safety is to educate in ways to control hazards, evacuate properly, and to understand overall fire safety.

In Conclusion:

While I concede that all fires and natural catastrophes can not be prevented. However; with a diligent program of education and training this office can mitigate the effects of these disasters. I have created a web page where safety information can be accessed at any time. Fire Prevention can be found on the town's website under Fire Department or Inspections. This site will never be complete, as new information is always going to be added.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Hull I herewith submit the 2011 Annual Report of the Harbormaster Department.

Along with its regular duties, the Harbormaster Department was very active during the 2011 boating season. The following is a summary of those activities.

The continued maintenance of Town floats and gangways at A Street Pier, Windemere, and James Ave, as well as the commuter float, waiting station and bathroom enclosure at Pemberton Pier. These floats and gangways have given the town residents and recreational boaters four points of landing and debarkation.

The Department also worked closely with the Hull Life Saving Museum, Nantasket Beach Salt Water Club, Steamboat Wharf Marina, Sunset Bay Marina and the Hull Yacht Club in a number of events hosted by all five groups this year. All events were well run and were enjoyed by all that participated. The Hull Yacht Club will also be hosting a blessing of the fleet in June 2011 in Allerton Harbor.

Assisted the Weymouth Harbormaster and Hingham Harbormaster with summer fireworks and Sailboat races sponsored by the Hingham Sailing Club. A number of events were also organized with the help of the Harbormaster Dept in 2011; they include The Swim Across America, Paddles for Poverty, Nantasket Fantasket Triathlon I, Carol School field trips to Bumpkin Island and the Boy Scout field trips to Bumpkin and Grape Island.

The Department this year saw mooring permits applications drop off to 800, with non residents making up more than half of the vessels moored or slipped. In 2011 The Harbor Master Department collected 98% of its mooring fees and is actively going after the remaining 2% with help from the Environmental Police computer data base and the Hingham District Court.

The Shellfish beds were opened January 1, 2011 and remained open for commercial / restricted digging until October 31, 2011. In 2011 the Shellfish Department again received a grant from the Division of Marine Fisheries of \$12,500 dollars to seed the clam beds south of the Hull Light Plant and north of Nantasket Pier. The seeding program will continue in 2012 due to the success of the first and second plantings in 2010 and

2011. The shellfish beds will open for commercial / restricted digging on May 1st 2012 and close October 31st 2012

The Pump-Out vessel removed 3400 gallons of waste water from the holding tanks of vessels that were slipped or moored in and around the waters of Hull this past boating season .The funding for the pump-out boat comes from a grant every year from the Division of Marine Fisheries which 75% is paid by the DMF and 25% by the Harbormaster Department. Over the past 14 years the Harbormaster Department has pumped over 41,000 gallons of waste water from these vessels.

The Town of Hull and Weymouth Harbormaster Departments received funding thru a grant from the Hingham Harbormaster Department for survey and design work of the mooring fields in the Weir River and Weymouth Back River. This project will be completed spring of 2012.

Projects completed in 2011 and to start in 2012

The repainting and repair the waiting station at Pemberton Pier, spring 2012

The renovation of the commuter float at Pemberton Pier was scheduled for May 2011, but was delayed due to a \$550,000 grant for repairs to the commuter float, waiting station, new public restrooms and relocation of the commuter float to deeper water. This project should be completed fall of 2012

The replacement of decking and railings at A Street Pier is ongoing

The replacement of decking and railings at Windemere Pier, spring 2012

Piling replacement at Pemberton Pier, fall of 2012

Rebuilding of the town floats at James Ave Landing and A Street Pier completed spring of 2011.

The Harbor Master Department, along with the Massachusetts Environmental Police will be hosting a safe boating course in April 2012 at the Nantasket Beach Salt Water Club.

The Harbor Master Department is also working closely with the DCR on the dredging of Nantasket Pier and the construction projects on Georges Island and Peddocks Island in 2012 thru 2013. Dredging of Nantasket Pier was scheduled for November 2010, but permitting was held up and it is now on line for October 2012.

I wish to thank the hard work and dedication of the Assistant Harbormasters, William Aucoin, and Paul Cummings .I would also like to thank the Citizens of Hull, the Board of Selectmen and the Town Manager for their continued support. I would also like to acknowledge the cooperation of the Hull Police Chief Richard Billings, Fire Chief Robert Hollingshead, Director of Public Works Joseph Stigliani, Light Plant Manager Richard Miller, Conservation Officer Annemarie Herbst, Director of Community Development Robert Fultz and all other Town Departments who have assisted us in the past year.

The Hull Historical Commission Annual Report for the year ending 12/31/11

The Historical Commission was created to identify, document and safeguard the unique and distinctive physical attributes of the Town of hull including buildings, monuments, and historical and archaeological sites.

There are seven positions. Membership is voluntary. Members are appointed by the selectmen for a three year term. Currently there is one vacancy.

PROJECTS

History Scan-

Members, led by Florence Lathrop, have been scanning and digitally storing the archival collection of photographs, documents and memorabilia owned largely by the Hull Historical Society and stored at the Old Town Hall in order preserve and eventually create a website where the material can be accessed via the internet. With the resurgence of the Historical Society this year, the Commission may be able to hand the work back over to the Society, or at least work in partnership with them as well as with the Hull Lifesaving Museum, whose personnel have been extremely helpful with the project.

Historical Coalition

The Historical Commission has begun an effort to create an Historical Coalition with the Historical Society in order to pool personnel and resources for the advancement of issues and projects pertaining to the historical heritage of the Town of Hull. We hope to include other organizations and individuals in the coalition.

Architectural Survey

The survey of town buildings continues. Buildings over 50 years old are being documented and entered onto the Massachusetts Historical Commission Macras Files. Information collected includes current photos, an historical narrative and an architectural description.

The Historical Commission is not funded by the Town of Hull and is seeking grant money and donations to help purchase equipment and expertise to accomplish its mission.

Mission Statement

The Hull Public Library is a central repository of archival, popular and current information. Its purpose is to assemble, preserve, and make accessible to all residents an organized collection of print and electronic materials. The Library provides free access to ideas and information, essential to a free and democratic society, as well as a warm and studious environment that welcomes patrons of all ages and interests.

- 9. Museum passes and Special Programs sponsored by the Friends of the Hull Public Library and the Hull Cultural Council.
- 10. Access to the Old Colony Library Network (see below).

Museum Passes contributed by the Friends of the Library offer deeply discounted or free admission to the following area attractions: Children's Museum, New England Aquarium, Franklin Park & Stone Zoos, Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum, JFK Museum, Museum of Fine Arts and Museum of Science.

The Old Colony Library Network (OCLN): Membership in OCLN is based on an annual assessment that allows Hull Public Library cardholders access to 28 network libraries and branches, in 26 cities and towns on the south shore, as well as 2 academic libraries. Library patrons may borrow directly from these libraries, or request materials from these libraries that can later be picked up at the Hull Library. In order to access the above services, the Hull Public Library needs to retain its certification by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners.

In addition to over two million holdings at these institutions, membership in the OCLN allows library users access to a virtual library that contains periodical databases and other digital media. A recent addition to the OCLN virtual library is the Overdrive program. This program allows cardholders to check out electronic and audio books online and download these directly to their computers or other devices. In FY 11, Hull residents checked out over 87,000 items at the Hull Public Library and other network libraries.

2011 Activities and Highlights:

The Trustees realize the importance of a public library to the community, particularly in the current economic climate, and we will continue to do our utmost to preserve the public library, which is a vital resource to the all the citizens of Hull.

The present Hull Public Library has no meeting room. Many programs are held off site at such locations as the Nantasket Beach Salt Water Club and DCR Mary Jeanette Murray Bathhouse. We are very grateful to these institutions for hosting programs.

The Hull Library continued existing programs such as the Adult Book Discussion Group and pre-school story hour throughout 2011.

In 2011, the Library in conjunction with the Hull Lifesaving Museum and the Department of Conservation and Recreation continued a monthly lecture series at the Mary Jeannette Bathhouse.

Some of the highlights of this series include the following:

- "Knox Cannon Train" with John Horrigan

The *Hull Cultural Council* and the *Friends of the Hull Public Library* sponsored three programs for cultural enrichment in 2011 geared towards children:

Crazz-zy Critters Reptile Show February 2011 Steve Rudolph Magician July 2011 Crazz-zy Critters (back by popular demand!) November 2011

The Library's Children's Department holds pre school story hours through out the year in six or eight week cycles. School year story time hour also included craft activities. In May or June the Library hosts Kindergarten classes and provides these children with their first library cards. The Hull Public Library works with the Hull School Department to provide reading materials from school summer reading lists.

In November 2011, Katherine Lacy resigned as a Library Trustee. Her successor will be elected in May 2012.

Each year in the months of November and December, the Hull Public Library waives fines on items borrowed at the Hull Library. In return, library users are asked to donate non-perishable food items, which are given to the Wellspring Food Pantry.

Fiscal Reductions.

The library budget was level funded in FY 12 at \$235,000. This is a good deal more than FY 10 (\$100,000) but not the level at which the Library was in FY 09 (\$275,000). Some staff hours and hours of operation were restored in FY 11. However, the goal of the Trustees is to restore the level of service to the FY 09 levels which is forty five hours of operation over a six day period. Currently the Library is open thirty eight hours over a five day period.

Library Certification:

To receive State Aid to Public Libraries, and to be eligible for reciprocal borrowing privileges with other libraries, a municipality and its library must be annually certified by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners (MBLC) as having met: 1) the municipal appropriation requirement (MAR) for the current fiscal year, and 2) a certain number of hours

based on population (in Hull's case 40 hours) and 3) a certain percentage of the library budget spent on the purchase of new library materials (in Hull's case 16% of the library budget).

The reduced FY 10 municipal appropriation caused the Hull Public Library to miss the Municipal Appropriation (MAR) in FY 10 and be decertified by the Massachusetts Board of Library for disprortionate cuts.

The significantly restored (although not totally) appropriation in FY 11 and again in FY 12 allowed the Library to be recertified and retain its certification by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners. However, because the Hull Library does not meet the full hour requirement, we do not receive the full amount of State Aid for libraries.

Having suffered the results of decertification in FY 10, including loss of reciprocal borrowing privileges at neighboring libraries, the Trustees are determined never to see this happen again.

Library Building Needs

In 2011, the Trustees made the decision to postpone for the foreseeable future, a new public library due to the economic situation and the fiscal limitations of the Town of Hull. Instead, we have re directed our efforts to the maintenance, repair and improvement of the current library building. Any public or private facility needs a capital needs list. The Trustees, after consulting the Library Director, have come up with four projects that need to be addressed. First, is a new roof. The current roof is thirty years old. This project is being addressed in an article at the 2012 Town Meeting. Second, is a new front desk. The current desk is in a space that is too small and does allow for adequate supervision of the first floor of the Library. A new front desk moved to an adjoining room will provide much better supervision of both the adult and children's areas on the first floor. Safety will be improved for both children and adults. Third, up to date and working computers are necessary for any enterprise. Plans for the purchase of new computers in the next few years need to be made now. Fourth, the lovely wraparound porch on the front of the building is poorly designed. A new design will eliminate the need for constant repair due to water damage.

Conclusion

The Hull Public Library was founded in its present location 1913. Almost one hundred years ago. Two world wars, the great depression, the civil rights era and many other events have occurred since 1913. Hull has changed in many ways too since then. However, the Library has always been there for the people of Hull.

We as Trustees are proud of our past but even more excited about our future, the second century of the Hull Public Library.

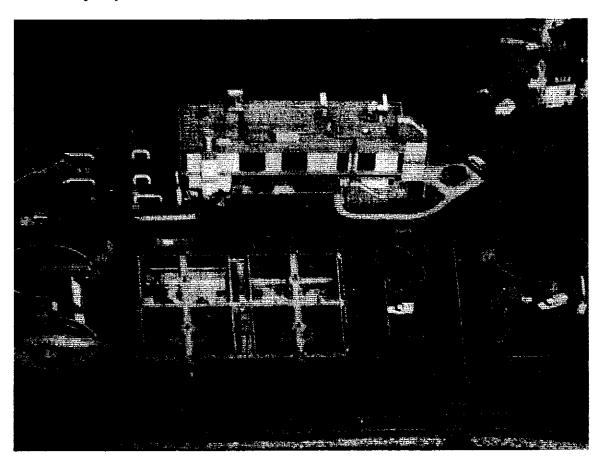

To the Honorable Board Of Selectmen and Citizens of Hull:

The Permanent Sewer Commission and Staff have completed another very active year. We would like to thank all the Commissioners for the time and effort they expend in the interests of the Town of Hull.



The Sewer Department is an enterprise operation and as such we are required to raise all revenue to cover all expenses. In FY-2011 we again raised sufficient revenue to cover all expenses. Revenue is raised through the sewer user fees, permit receipts and landfill leachate. Average daily flows into the treatment plant were, 1.75 million gallons per day, with a total flow for the year of 638 million gallons.

We continue to receive leachate from the Cohasset Heights Landfill the total for this year was over 3 million gallons, generating revenue of 222 thousand dollars. The revenue from this program helps us to keep the sewer user fees as low as possible.

AOS-United Water Inc. completed the seventh year of a 10-year contract to operate and maintain the collection system and the treatment plant. Work related to preventive maintenance continued to increase with over 2000 tasks being performed. Over 40,000 feet of sewer line were cleaned and 10,000 feet of sewer line televised to identify potential problems so they could be repaired prior to failure. Pumps, controls systems, and other treatment plant equipment were repaired, replaced or upgraded and pipes and manholes in the collection system were repaired during the year.

Each year over 1200 tests of the performance of the treatment plant are submitted to the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection and the United States Environmental Protection Agency to verify that the Plant is in compliance with its discharge permit. There were 4 violations of the National Pollution Discharge Elimination Permit. 3 of these were a result of a single event. Both events resulted in higher than allowable bacterial counts. The first result was caused by a pump test as part of weekly alarm testing occurring at the same time that a testing sample was drawn from the waste stream. This resulted in a short duration high count flow.

The second event, which accounted for three violations, was a result of a coastal storm which physically impacted the treatment plant causing a shut down of part of the treatment system. When the system was placed back on line the fecal coliform limit daily maximum was exceeded as well as the daily maximum for entrococci, which also resulted in the third violation of monthly average limit.

The de-chlorination system, that was built using in-house resources, has performed above expectations and all violations related to chlorination levels.

The project to line the cement sewer lines on Nantasket Ave and Bay St was undertaken with the contact being awarded to Lash Construction from New York. The bid was for 1 million dollars which was 2/3rds of the anticipated cost. The project was increased to a value of 1.2 million dollars to increase the amount of pipe to be rehabilitated. This is the second phase of restoration for pipes that are being damaged by hydrogen sulfide. This work, for which SEA is the engineer, will carry through into the 2012 fiscal year.

The ductile iron force main, which carries sewage from the pump station in Pemberton to the treatment plant, suffered two failures. The pipe was found to be in extremely poor condition with some sections paper-thin. This line runs along the old railroad right of way along the ocean and any failure in that area would result in raw sewage being lost into the Atlantic Ocean. Due to the serious nature of this situation the process to effect repair was fast tracked to move the work forward to the summer of 2012. Tighe and Bond engineering was awarded the contact for design and bid of the project. Because of the location, pipe bursting will be used for the section along the coast which will minimize open trench work in that area. This project will be completed in the fall of 2012.

A portion of the sewer line on Newton Street was replaced and a number of repairs where undertaken on Spring St.

We would like to thank all those who have given us immeasurable assistance and support in our endeavors during this past year.

HULL PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT: JANUARY 1, 2011 – DECEMBER 31, 2011

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen, Town Manager and Citizens of Hull:

The Hull Planning Board herein submits it's Annual Report for the year ending December 31, 2011. The Planning Board is composed of seven residents elected to five year terms. The establishment of municipal Planning Boards is authorized under MGL, Chapter 41, Section, 81A.

The Hull Planning Board meets on the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month at 7:30 PM in the Louis Costa Meeting Room, unless a meeting or hearing calls for a larger venue. The Director of Community Development and Planning Robert Fultz provides the Board with part-time planning services and Ellen Barone is a part-time Administrative Assistant.

The Board welcomed Kelly Phelan who was elected to the Planning Board this year with a term to expire in 2016. We wish to thank Frank Parker for his past service on the Board.

Prior to the 2011 Town Meeting, the Planning Board voted unanimously to recommend amendments to the Zoning Bylaws on three Articles. For Section 40 - Site Plan Review; language was added to ensure that project plans address the potential of flooding. Section 42 - Flood Plain District Use and Development was amended to include revised building code language for Flood Resistant Construction and Construction in Coastal Dunes. A new footnote was added to Section 50 - 2 that allows the Special Permit Granting Authority to use its discretion to issue a special permit that would allow existing buildings within a flood zone to be elevated beyond the prescribed height limit to provide flood proofing by meeting or exceeding the elevation requirements.

The Board has been researching zoning amendments for the planning area between Phipps Street and Rockland House Road. This area includes the DCR lease site. Jeanne Paquin served as Planning Board representative on the DCR Re-use Committee. The Committee developed an RFP for lease of the DCR property. The Planning Board continued to work with Steamboat Wharf, and Sunset Bay Marina, relative to their Orders of Conditions.

REPORT OF PLYMOUTH COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

The Commissioners of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project are pleased to submit the following report of our activities during 2011.

The Project is a special district created by the State Legislature in 1957, and is now composed of all Plymouth County towns, the City of Brockton, and the Town of Cohasset in Norfolk County. The Project is a regional response to a regional problem, and provides a way of organizing specialized equipment, specially trained employees, and mosquito control professionals into a single agency with a broad geographical area of responsibility.

As a result of a mild winter with abundant snow cover, the 2011 season began with a high water table and above average number of spring mosquitoes. As we expected the initial requests for spraying were numerous following the worst Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) threat in 100 years in 2010. Efforts were directed at larval mosquitoes starting with the spring brood. Ground and aerial larviciding was accomplished using B.t.i., an environmentally selective bacterial agent. Over 11,000 acres were aerial larvicided using the Project plane. Upon emergence of the spring brood of mosquitoes, ultra-low volume adulticiding began on June 1, 2011 and ended on September 16, 2011. The Project responded to 16,306 spray requests for service from residents. As part of our West Nile Virus control strategy a total of 58,701 catch basins were treated with larvicide in all of our towns to prevent West Nile Virus (WNV).

In response to the continued threat of mosquito borne diseases in the district, we increased our surveillance trapping, aerial and ground larviciding, and adult spray in areas of concern to protect public health.

The first virus isolations were identified on July 19, 2011 by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, a (WNV) West Nile Virus from a *Culex pipien/restuan*, a bird biting species, in Cohasset and on the same day a *Culiseta melanura*, a bird biting species, was found to have (EEE) Eastern Equine Encephalitis virus in the town of Bridgewater.

The 2011 season had a total of 34 EEE isolates, and 11 WNV trapped in Plymouth County as follows:

Based on guidelines defined by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health's "Vector Control Plan to Prevent EEE" in Massachusetts, the season began with 23 Plymouth County towns at "Low Level" and 4 towns at the "Moderate Level" for EEE risk category. The season ended with 19 Plymouth County towns at "Low Level" and 5 towns at the "Moderate Level" for EEE Risk and 4 towns at "high level" EEE risk category. In 2011 there were no human or horse cases as a result of contracting EEEV or WNV in Plymouth County.

The public health problem of EEE and WNV continues to ensure cooperation between the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project, local Boards of Health and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. In an effort to keep the public informed, EEE and WNV activity updates are regularly posted on The Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project website www.plymouthmosquito.org and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health website at www.state.ma.us/dph/wnv/wnv1.htm.

The figures specific to the town of Hull are given below. While mosquitoes do not respect town lines the information given below does provide a tally of the activities which have had the greatest impact on the health and comfort of Hull residents.

Insecticide Application. 190 acres were treated using truck mounted sprayers for control of adult mosquitoes. More than one application was made to the same site if mosquitoes reinvaded the area. The first treatments were made in June and the last in September.

During the summer 863 catch basins were treated to prevent the emergence of *Culex pipiens*, a known mosquito vector in West Nile Virus transmission.

Our greatest effort has been targeted at mosquitoes in the larval stage, which can be found in woodland pools, swamps, marshes and other standing water areas. Inspectors continually gather data on these sites and treat with highly specific larvicides when immature mosquitoes are present. Last year a total of 11 inspections were made to catalogued breeding sites.

Finally, we have been tracking response time, which is the time between notice of a mosquito problem and response by one of our inspectors. The complaint response time in the Town of Hull was less than three days with more than 108 complaints answered.

Mosquito Survey. Our surveillance showed that the dominant mosquitoes throughout the district were generally *Culiseta melanura* and *Coquillettidia perturbans*. In the Town of Hull the three most common mosquitoes were *Cs. melanura*, *Cx. species* and *Ae. vexans*.

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Hull Public Safety Dispatch Center (HPSDC) is to serve the citizens and visitors of this community by answering both emergency and non-emergency calls for service and dispatching the appropriate agency to that call as needed. It is our goal to handle all such requests in a courteous, professional, expeditious manner in order to reduce/minimize as much as possible the injury, loss, and/or trauma associated with that specific incident.

The Hull Public Safety Dispatch Center serves the citizens and visitors of the Town of Hull. We answer calls for service and dispatch for the Hull Police and, Hull Fire/EMS Our dispatch personnel answered a total of nineteen hundred and nine (1,909) E-9-1-1 calls during calendar year 2011 and received and/or dispatched fifteen thousand seven hundred and twenty nine (15,729) calls for service.

At the close of 2011 we transitioned to the South Shore Regional Communications Center located in Hingham, I want to take this occasion to thank all our dedicated and hard working employees. Your positive attitude made a big difference during this transition, and I really appreciated your support.

Dear Citizens,

I would like to thank Board Members Phyllis Aucoin,, Jaqueline Chase, Spencer Oloughlin and James Tobin for the time and effort they have contributed to the Hull Redevelopment Authority and the citizens of Hull.

Our fiscal year ends June 30th each year, therefore our financial statements are until June 30th 2011. On May 9, 2011 the board voted to move the majority of the HRA funds from Merrill Lynch Wealth Management Account to The Hingham Institution for Savings. This move will provide a higher rate of return on the money, and it will be held locally.

The Authority continues to collect revenues for the lease of the parking lots and the concession leases. The Town receives \$9500.00 per year for license fees. The Authority paid PILOT payments to the town for fiscal years 2011 and 2012 in the amount of \$65,000.00 for each year. The Friends of the Paragon Carousel continue to pay down their loan to the Authority.

The Authority has done some site improvements this year with the demolition of the building at 2 Samoset Ave. The main Park Parcel hosted the Thanksgiving Bonfire/Celebration, the Hull Youth Football Carnival fundraiser, and The Hull Boosters Carnival last year. We are putting the parking lots out to bid again this year and we will also be hosting the HYFA carnival again this year.

After many months of negotiation with the designated developer of the HRA property, the Authority voted unananimously to terminate the Land Disposition Agreement after the board concluded the developer was in default of their obligations under section 10 of the Land Disposition agreement dated July 9, 2004. The Authority continues to work diligently for the citizens of Hull.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HULL SCHOOL COMMITTEE:

The Hull School District is continuing on its course of steady progress. The staff makes regular curriculum improvements. Staff and students are improving teaching and learning, thus increasing academic achievement at every level. According to the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education we are out-performing similar communities in both English language arts and mathematics. The faculty is committed to sustaining our momentum, in spite of the fact that due to budget restrictions, we are working with fewer personnel and fewer resources.

Our academic programs are rigorous. High standards are being met, as evidenced by improvement on Advanced Placement Examinations, MCAS tests, college admissions, and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts' nomination of our high school as a National Blue Ribbon School, the highest award in K-12 education. We provide academic excellence in a caring environment. Students conduct themselves in a studious, courteous and orderly manner. The environments at the L. M. Jacobs School, Memorial Middle School and Hull High School are conducive to learning. The students enjoy and value their state-of-the-art facilities.

We are please to announce the return of our adult education program providing interesting courses for dozens of Hull residents. The entire school community extends its appreciation to the citizens of Hull for the support of their schools.

L.M. Jacobs School Highlights

- There were a variety of free kindergarten transition activities to all preschool and kindergarten-aged town residents.
- Kindergarten-aged students were provided with a high-quality, free half-day and sliding fee based full-day kindergarten program.
- Leveled Literacy Interventions were introduced to target students reading below grade level.
- The FASTT Math program, a computer based program, was continued to assist students with the mastering of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division facts.
- The TerraNova tests of basic mathematics and English language arts skills were administered in grades 2-5 and the Gates-MacGinitie Reading Test was administered in grade one. Test results assisted with curriculum and instruction decisions.
- Over \$500 was raised for the Jacobs School library through the One for Books program.
- Students have writing folders, poetry journals, and math journals as part of John Collins Writing.
- The school-wide anti-bullying programs, Second Steps and Steps to Respect, were continued.
- Anti-bullying presentations for grades K-2 and 3-5 were provided.
- The Forsyth Dental Program was offered at the Jacobs this year.
- Numerous fee-based and school-funded after school activities were provided to students.
 - The Jacobs After School Program for Enrichment and Recreation (JASPER), a fee-based program offered three (3) times a year, allowed students to participate in a variety of extracurricular activities of high interest.
 - o Through JASPER we contracted with Mad Science of Greater Boston to offer a Science Enrichment Program for 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th grade students who have a high level of interest in science and are performing above their peers either in the classroom or on the state MCAS test.
 - We also expanded the JASPER Open Gym program offering activities both before and after school.

- Parent volunteers ran a before-school Math Enrichment League. Students in grades three (3), four (4), and five (5) participated each week.
- Math Week was held to prepare students for MCAS testing.
- The Senior Citizen/Community Member volunteer program was continued in order to staff the library and make it accessible to students.
- Students were videotaped conducting Book Talks, and these videos were displayed at the book fair, televised on local cable, and given to Scholastic Books.
- Over 1,500 cans were collected and donated to Wellspring Multi-Service Center during the Holiday Barter.
- Family Literacy Month was celebrated by offering a variety of in-school and out-of-school activities for students and families, including two (2) Cozy Up with a Book Family Nights.
- Community members, parents, coaches, politicians, and retirees read to our students during our Literacy week.
- Students participated in the Fire Safety Poster Contest supported by the Hull Fire Department.
- Many terrific programs were offered to the students by the PTO including: Jacobs Express Day, two (2) Book Fairs, Bingo for Books, Halloween Party and the Art Fair.
- A Read-a-thon was sponsored by the PTO and had over 300 students who participated.
- The PTO sponsored the storyteller Abraham Lincoln.
- The principal held monthly coffee hours to hear parent concerns, ideas, suggestions, and feedback.
- Four (4) MCAS tutors were hired to work during school to support the learning of efficient test strategies.
- Students were provided with additional academic support through after-school tutoring in mathematics and reading.
- The summer school program at Jacobs provided students with instruction in reading, mathematics, and technology.
- Students in the Recycling Club collected all paper recyclables in the Jacobs building on a weekly basis.
- A school-wide Spelling Bee was developed.
- School-wide recognition assemblies were conducted.
- A weekly Golden Bus Award was initiated to reward proper behavior on the buses.
- Students used iPads to support access to the curriculum.
- The following enrichment activities were provided: fourth grade Science Fair, third grade American Revolution Wax Museum and the author Brian Lees of *Bats at the Beach* demonstrated to each grade level how a book was made.
- Students attended a production of A Day with Frog and Toad as performed by Hull High School Theatre Arts.
- Fourth and fifth grade students participated in their third annual Turkey Trot under the direction of Mr. Kyle Shaw.

Memorial Middle School Highlights

- Ms. Paula Maxwell completed her term as Acting Principal in June 2011.
- Mr. Anthony Hrivnak assumed the Principalship in July 2011.
- A successful Grade Six Open House was held in August 2011 to welcome sixth grade parents and students to the Middle School. The 6th grade team used the first three days of school to help transition the incoming 6th grade to Memorial. The team worked to reduce student concerns and anxiety over changing classes, the use of lockers and locker combinations, homework responsibilities, and a variety of experiences new to students in middle school.
- A successful Open House evening was held in September to welcome all parents and students to Memorial.
 Parents met with the administration and the unified arts faculty in the auditorium. After the introduction, parents attended presentations by grade level teams.
- Last spring, Memorial entered the Scholastic Book Fair National Middle School contest and was awarded 2nd prize for the depiction of a carnival during book fair week. The school was awarded \$1,000.

- The *Pirate News* went digital and was provided to parents, students, and the community via email. Hard copies were provided when requested by parents.
- The Memorial website was updated regularly with the most important upcoming events and dates.
- The faculty maintained updated websites for their students to retrieve information about homework and the day's lesson.
- School Council met every four to six weeks to advise the principal and to review the handbook, the budget, and the School Improvement Plan. Jennifer Gonzalez, Stacey Jones, David Gardiner, Laura Tannuzzo, Heather Hughes, and Elizabeth Flanagan served on the School Council.
- Students participated in the Lions Club International Peace Poster Contest. Stacia Foresta was awarded first prize. Kora Banville, Autumn Nutile, Jillian Larsen, and Margaret Canavan were awarded honorable mentions.
- The Second Step Program continued into its second year as a way to improve school culture, to assist students as they manage student conflicts, and to reduce incidents of bullying. The program was also integrated into the 7th grade wellness program to continue to assist students with these issues.
- The Pirate Pride program recognizes students who do good deeds or go above and beyond Memorial's expectations. Each day two students are recognized during daily announcements for their good deeds. Once a month a drawing is held to award one student a gift certificate from all the students who were recognized the previous month.
- The Forsyth Dental program was offered at Memorial this year. This is a free dental program that offered
 oral and dental exams by licensed dentists, teeth cleaning, fluoride treatments, sealants, temporary fillings,
 and referrals to local dentists for follow-up. Students took advantage of the program in the fall and again
 in the spring.
- This past September, the flu vaccine was again made available to all Memorial students.
- The following after school activities were offered: Student Council, Yearbook, Homework Zone, Jazz Band, and Chorus.
- Zoe Xypteras, grade 8, represented Memorial Middle School and the Town of Hull by participating in *Project* 351, a state-wide community service program sponsored by Governor Deval Patrick.
- Hull High School students completed an internship program and provided tutoring to students in grades 6 8.
- Study Island, a web-based program supporting English language arts (ELA) and mathematics, was provided to all students in grades 6 8. This program provides supplemental activities and exposure to the daily ELA and mathematics instructions. Each activity correlates with Massachusetts ELA and mathematics standards currently being tested by the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS).
- The PTO sponsored two book fairs at the Memorial Middle School, which were scheduled during parent conferences to provide parents with opportunities to purchase books.
- The PTO sponsored the 9th Annual Read-a-thon. Students at Memorial read for 59,685 minutes and raised \$416. Top readers were Emily Menice, 6th grade; Jamie Froio, 7th grade; and Trevor Fahey, 8th grade.
- Eighth grade students participated in three Hull High School sports: Field Hockey, Hockey, and Lacrosse.
- Seventh and eighth grade students participated in the drama programs including *Cinderella*, *Curtains* and *Charlotte's Web*.
- Memorial's Music Program hosted a winter concert in January and a spring concert in May. The following ensembles performed: 6th grade Band, 6th Grade Chorus, 7th and 8th grade combined Band, 7th and 8th grade combined Chorus, and Jazz Band. Hull Public Schools hopes to be forming a marching band. This year, 7th and 8th grade students joined high school students to form a pep band. The pep band performed at the Hull High School's pep rally and plans to perform at graduation this year.
- The Memorial faculty began a Writing Across the Curriculum initiative in February. Two days each month, students spend a portion of each period in all classes on a writing assignment designed to support the day's content. This exercise serves as an introduction to Writing Across the Curriculum with the purpose of building fluency. Writing Across the Curriculum also allows students to express their creativity and to use higher order skills such as analysis, synthesis, and evaluation.

- The 6th grade sponsored the Pi (p) Day Challenge on March 14th (3.14). Students studied the relationship between the radius of a circle and its circumference. Students learned how this relationship is important to the study of mathematics, science, technology, and engineering.
- Memorial Student Council sponsored two dances and organized Hats for Hunger, a monthly event to raise money and collect food for needy families in Hull.
- A committee of 8th grade parents met multiple times throughout the year to organize the 8th grade Semi-formal dance.
- The 6th grade class attended a field trip to the Museum of Science to view the traveling Pompeii exhibit. Students returned amazed and fascinated with the story of the lost city.
- The 7th grade class attended a field trip to the New England Aquarium in the winter and to the Museum of Fine Arts in the spring.

Hull High School Highlights

- Students at Hull High School continued to excel in all areas of the MCAS
 - o 74% of 9th graders scored either Advanced or Proficient on the Introductory Physics MCAS.
 - o 84% of 10th graders scored either *Advanced* or *Proficient* on the Mathematics MCAS.
 - o 91% of 10th graders scored either *Advanced* or *Proficient* on the Biology MCAS.
 - o 95% of 10th graders scored either Advanced or Proficient on the English Language Arts MCAS.
- The Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education nominated Hull High School as a National Blue Ribbon School. This nomination was in recognition of the school's outstanding scores and improvement on the English Language Arts and Mathematics MCAS exams.
- Hull High School students continued to have the opportunity to take Advanced Placement classes. Sixty-three (63) students were enrolled in one or more of the following Advanced Placement (AP) courses during the 2010 2011 school year:
 - o English Literature and Composition
 - English Language and Composition
 - Spanish
 - United States History
 - Environmental Science
 - Calculus
 - o Biology
- Fourteen (14) students earned special recognition from The College Board due to their exceptional scores on three or more AP Exams.
- The College Board named Hull High School to its AP Honor Roll, one of fewer than 400 schools in North America to receive this honor. This honor was in recognition of increasing the number of students taking Advanced Placement examinations while also increasing student scores.
- Two (2) members of the Class of 2012 were recognized by the College Board as National Merit Scholarship Program Commended Students.
- Supervised by the Hull High School Student Outreach Coordinator, twenty-one (21) students participated in school-day internships with local businesses and non-profit and governmental agencies during the 2011-2012 school year.
- The Hull High School Student Outreach Coordinator secured a grant for \$51,916 through the South Shore Workforce Investment Board, allowing students to gain career-related skills.
- More than sixty (60) Hull High School students were given the opportunity of taking on-line courses through Virtual High School (VHS) and the Middlebury on-line foreign language program.
- Hull High School participated in its decennial New England Accreditation of Schools and Colleges (NEASC)
 accreditation visit. The entire community welcomed the sixteen (16) member visiting team and was invited to
 participate in panels, interviews, and observations.

- The Hull Boosters and Friends of Hull High School Theatre Arts raised more than \$100,000 in order to fund the Hull High School athletic and drama programs.
- The Hull High School Council sponsored a successful Quiz Night that raised over \$4,000 to support cocurricular activities.
- By attending co-curricular activities, earning exceptional grades, and completing the most hours of community service, the Class of 2012 won the first Hull High School Class Cup competition.
- The Hull High School Athletic Department offered fifteen (15) sports and twenty-seven (27) teams. The girls' lacrosse team, as well as several members of the track team, qualified for the state tournament. Twenty-seven (27) student-athletes were named as South Shore League All-stars.
- Hull High School Theatre Arts presented a full-season of musical productions. Student-actors performed How to Succeed in Business without Really Trying, A Day with Frog and Toad, and Cinderella. Thanks to the generosity of the Hull PTO, the children's production was presented free of charge to all students at the Jacobs Elementary School.
- Eighty-one (81) members of the Hull High School Class of 2011 were presented diplomas during graduation ceremonies on the Finlayson Athletic Field.
- Thanks to the generosity of the Hull community, more than \$50,000 in scholarships were awarded to the members of the Class of 2011 at the annual Senior Awards and Scholarships Evening. Fifty-three (53) students received one or more scholarships.

Student Services Highlights

- Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) conducted a mandated mid-cycle review in December 2011 and the district was found to be in compliance in all areas.
- An independent review of the special education program for the Hull Public Schools was conducted by Walker Partnerships, a division of Walker, to provide the district with areas of strengths, needs and recommendations. The report was presented by James Shillinglaw at a School Committee meeting. Overall, the findings indicated that the special education program had many strengths and needed to continue to expand co-teaching opportunities.
- A new Student Services Procedures and Regulations Handbook was created in response to the many new regulations as a reference for administrators and special education staff.
- A \$10,000 competitive grant (increased by \$5000 from last year) was obtained through the Evan Henry Foundation for Autism. A five (5) week after-school program for students with significant disabilities to generalize their social skills to the community was implemented. The Team Based Learning (TBL) teachers and speech/language pathologists created the curriculum and community activities. The grant monies were also used to purchase materials for the TBL classrooms and speech/language pathologists.
- Collaboration occurred between the elementary special education teachers and the literacy coaches to
 accelerate reading skills for students with special needs by collecting data and implementing a leveled literacy
 program in combination with Wilson Reading. Data was collected and progress for each student was closely
 monitored. Special education teachers were supported on a weekly basis by the literacy coaches and trained
 on the leveled literacy intervention program.
- The literacy coaches provided a day of professional development for the elementary and middle school special education teachers and the reading specialists on effective practices to utilize with struggling readers.
- Special education legal considerations were effectively managed throughout the district. The Director of Student Services read and edited each IEP before sending to parents.
- Administrators attended as many initial and re-evaluations TEAM meetings as possible, across the district, to implement consistent eligibility standards.
- The Director of Student Services was consistently available to student services staff to collaborate on challenging student issues, chair Team meetings, as well as develop positive relationships with parents and staff.
- The Director of Student Services collaborated consistently with principals and assistant principals regarding student services issues across the district and worked closely with the out of district liaison to ensure students are educated in the least restrictive environment.
- The Director of Student Services collaborated closely with Team Based Learning (TBL) teachers and TIDES teachers to support students being educated in their community school.
- The TBL program was expanded to Hull High School for students in grades 9-12.

- The membership in Hull Special Education Parent Association (Hull SEPAC) continued to expand and speakers were arranged. Speakers and topics included the following: Roles of the Special Education Service Providers presented by six (6) special education staff members, Grief Process by Maria Trozzi, ADHD by Keith Kosierowski, Adolescent Psychology by Joani Geltman, and Let's Get Organized in conjunction with Hull Family Network. These events were open to the entire school system as well as other local communities.
- Regular education and special education teachers participated in professional development on collaboration between regular education and special education to provide successful inclusion experiences for all students.
 Dr. Lisa Dieker, from the University of Central Florida was the presenter and the event took place at the ACCEPT Collaborative.
- The preschool program continued their parent-training program to promote generalization of skills from school to home. Parent training sessions are held on Fridays and both group and individual sessions are provided as well as babysitting services.
- The Director of Student Services attended and participated in the high school student assistance team each Wednesday to stay in touch with student issues and to be directly involved with high school staff.

Professional Development and Curriculum Highlights Pre-Kindergarten – Grade 12

- In June 2011, the administrative team held a retreat to redefine district goals and write plans for the 2011-2012 school year. Administrators also had professional development on educational legal issues and instruction and learning.
- The leadership team had professional development in Instructional Rounds, a strategy to develop a shared understanding of high-quality instruction. The administrative team engaged in Instructional Rounds by together visiting classrooms at the Jacobs, Memorial, and Hull High Schools.
- Twenty-eight (28) teachers representing all schools participated in the district-sponsored, graduate course Differentiated Instruction I through Simmons College.
- Two graduate level courses are scheduled to focus on *Writing Across the Curriculum* through Emmanuel College and Differentiated Instruction II/Project-Based Learning through Simmons College.
- Eight (8) English Language Arts (ELA) and reading teachers participated on the K-12 ELA Articulation Team. Teachers met to review the new Massachusetts English standards and began to write grade-level curriculum for English. The ELA Articulation Team will reconvene to continue to write curriculum.
- Nine (9) teachers, one (1) tutor, and two (2) administrators participated in Category I training, a statemandated training to support students whose first language is not English.
- Dr. Joy Turpie, Literacy Coach at Jacobs School, and Ms. Jennifer Reardon, teacher at Memorial Middle, were selected by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education as Category IV trainers, a state-mandated training to support students whose first language is not English. Dr. Turpie and Ms. Reardon trained a total of seven (7) teachers from the middle and high schools.
- The district is focused on writing. Regular education and special education teachers at the Jacobs Elementary and Memorial Middle School received professional development in the John Collins' Writing Method.
- Grades 7-12 English teachers met to discuss writing expectations for each grade level according to the new 2011 Massachusetts Curriculum Frameworks.
- A total of three (3) mathematics teachers representing Memorial Middle School and Hull High School, one (1) science teacher from Hull High School, and school and district administrators have collaborative meetings to discuss the current mathematics and science course pathways and to plan for future course pathways.
- A member of the High School Mathematics Articulation Team and the Director of Curriculum, Instruction, and Professional Development attended meetings by the DESE on the new 2011 Massachusetts Curriculum Frameworks based on the Common Core State Standards.

- The district was awarded the MassGrad grant from the DESE, a competitive grant for \$12,500 that spanned two academic school years. The grant focused on dropout prevention and supported the Dropout Prevention Team, made up of teachers, guidance counselors, adjustment counselors, and administrators from Memorial Middle School and Hull High School. District administrators and the Student Outreach Coordinator also participated on the team.
- Two (2) teachers from the Jacobs Elementary School wrote a mentor teacher handbook to support the district's teacher mentoring program.
- A total of eight (8) new educators attended the Hull Public Schools' New Teacher Orientation in August 2011.
 Educators were orientated to the district's policy and procedures, Special Education laws and procedures, the new 2011 Massachusetts Curriculum Frameworks, and a tour of Hull. Educators met with their principals.
 New educators were assigned teacher mentors and were guests of the O'Brien family at a luncheon at Jake's.
- The Teaching, Learning, and Professional Development Committee met during the summer to plan professional development for the 2011-2012 school year.
- A team of administrators and members from Hull Teachers Association attended a meeting to understand the new regulations for the DESE's Educator Evaluation system.

Jacobs Elementary School

- The Assistant Principal led book discussion groups on the topic of robust vocabulary.
- Ms. Kerrie Ryan, the computer teacher, provided training in using SMART boards.
- The Literacy Coaches provided professional development on Effective Pacing during Instruction and provided ongoing grade-level professional development on implementing grade-level units of study.
- Teachers participated in peer observations.
- Staff was provided professional development on inclusive classrooms and differentiated instruction.
- Teachers worked as grade level teams to analyze ELA and mathematics MCAS results. Teachers identified math open response items that would be used for students to practice answering.
- Teachers reviewed the grade-level priority standards generated by the K-12 ELA Articulation Team.
- Teachers, according to grade level, received professional development on the John Collins Writing Program. They reviewed students' progress, observed lessons, and generated next steps for implementation.
- Teachers received professional development on Everyday Math.
- Teachers and staff were training on the new student information database, Aspen, and teachers were trained on TestWiz.

Memorial Middle School

- English language arts, mathematics, and science teachers analyzed MCAS scores to refine instructional practices and address students' learning needs.
- A team of teachers, the principal, and district administrators participated in Performance Improvement Mapping, to understand student performance and to create a plan to improve student performance.
- All teachers were provided with an overview of the John Collins Writing Method. English language arts teachers and special education teachers met with a consultant on two follow-up days in grade-level sessions. Science teachers also met with a consultant for professional development.
- Mathematics teachers participated in individualized professional development during the day. The professional development took place in classrooms during instructional time with the teacher and consultant in the classrooms with students. Teachers also participated in professional development after school.
- English language arts, mathematics, and science teachers met to begin writing grade-level curriculum for their subject area in response to the new Massachusetts Curriculum Frameworks.
- Teachers participated in peer observations.
- Teachers and staff were trained on Aspen and teachers were trained on SMART boards.

Hull High School

- Staff met to prepare for the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC) visiting team and to create new Hull High School 21st Century Learning Expectations.
- The faculty met throughout the year in Professional Learning Communities to analyze MCAS data and to develop plans to address student deficiencies in specific areas.
- A team of teachers, guidance counselors, school adjustment counselors, the Student Outreach Coordinator, and high school and district administrators met to address dropout prevention. Faculty members also worked to devise a plan.
- Two (2) mathematics teachers and one (1) science teacher met to begin writing curriculum on high school math courses according to the new 2011 Massachusetts Curriculum Frameworks.
- The high school member of the K-12 ELA Articulation Team, the High School Principal, and the Director of Curriculum, Instruction, and Professional Development attended meetings with representatives from Bridgewater State University's faculty to facilitate articulation on college and career readiness skills.
- Teachers participated in peer observations.
- Teachers and staff were trained on Aspen, as well as the use of TestWiz.

Technology Implementation Highlights

Jacobs Elementary School - Technology implementation for the Jacobs Elementary School was maintained and upgraded on a regular basis according to the following:

- Library Media Center 28 student computers, three (3) teacher computers and two (2) network color laser printers.
- Computer Lab 25 student computers and one (1) teacher computer, a color network laser printer.
- Seven (7) Interactive White Boards, three (3) Promethean ACTIVBoards with LCD projectors and Activotes located in the Computer Lab, Library Media Center and a classroom, four (4) SMART board DViTs with LCD projectors with three (3) located in classrooms for "digital classrooms" and one (1) in the Library Media Center Conference Room for general access.
- Eleven (11) iPad2 tablets for administrative and student use.
- Three (3) computers in each classroom (one for teacher use, two for student use).
- Computers for administrative staff.

- Library Media Center with (30) Thin Clients, (2) teacher computers, a scanner and two (2) network laser printers.
- Macintosh Music Lab with (15) Apple workstations and one teacher computer with a printer.
- Five (5) iPad2 tablets for administrative and student use.
- TV Production Program with two (2) editing suites, control room, TV studio, cameras, camcorders and audio equipment.
- Graphic Arts Computer Lab with fourteen (14) computers, two (2) printers, a scanner and a high speed Xerox color copier/network printer.

- Two (2) fiber Internet connections.
- Digital phone system in all classrooms and offices.
- Voice over IP Telephony.
- Integrated video system for all classrooms.

- Three (3) File Servers for data and applications, telephony, antivirus and asset management.
- Ten (10) Internet enabled netbooks assigned to students.

District Wide Area Network (WAN) is maintained and upgraded on a regular basis according to the following:

• All schools and the central office are connected to the town WAN via a fiber optic backbone. A Windows Data Network connects all schools and the Central Office. Servers in each school provide students with electronic portfolio space to store their work and save it throughout their education. At each location a Fortigate Firewall provides security and internet content and site filtering. A Ghost Site License is used for workstation management and imaging and a Symantec End Point Antivirus Site License for virus protection. All schools are connected to the town wide Microsoft Exchange Email System and the remote hosted town and school website. Various software systems are installed and supported such as Microsoft Office Professional, the Winnebago Library Electronic Catalog System, Rediker Administrative Software, GradeQuick, Nutrikids, Inspiration for Elementary and Middle Schools, Eutactics Software, and other curriculum integrated software packages.

Communications are maintained and upgraded on a regular basis according to the following:

• The Connect-ED telephone communication system is maintained and updated with all student's home phones and parent cell phone numbers. A single message can be sent out from school administrators to all parents within seconds. All school administrators have Sprint Blackberries to communicate with all town emergency personnel. The website is maintained and updated on a daily basis by teachers and staff. Anyone may subscribe electronically to Hull Public Schools News and Announcements via the website to receive information directly to their email account.

Operations Highlights

Facilities Maintenance, Upkeep, and Scheduling

- Continued to refine and improve the automated work order system through Facility Direct and Maintenance Direct (SchoolDude) tracking requests from administrators, teachers, custodians, and community groups.
- Responded to over two thousand requests for services, generally within one hour.
- Waterproofed most of the north facing exterior brick walls at Hull High School to prevent leaking through the masonry.
- Refinished gymnasium floors at Hull High School and Jacobs Elementary Schools and stage area at Memorial Middle School.
- Relined and painted parking lots at Hull High School and Jacobs Elementary School.
- Removed tile and aluminum treads and replaced with skid resistant surfacing.
- Replaced original wood entry frame, sidelights and transom with anodized aluminum and insulated glass at the Memorial Middle School.
- Replaced a portion of the fire sprinkler system that was improperly installed during construction at the Memorial Middle School.
- Repaired both side entrance steps at the Memorial Middle School.
- Repaired and/or replaced over sixty sash balances and hardware for windows at the Memorial Middle School that had worn due to the size and weight of the sash.
- Capped sewer pipes related to a nuisance drain and venting problem due to incomplete installation during the construction/remodeling of Jacobs Elementary School.
- Replaced venting headwall flashing over the North East wing at the Jacobs Elementary School, which had been leaking since installation.
- Coordinated activities with local volunteers and provided necessary supplies to improve the landscaping of the schools.

Energy Management

- Saved over \$80,000 in energy related expenses through an ongoing program of conservation and energy management.
- Extended the contract to purchase natural gas in the open market through a joint effort with South Shore Energy Collaborative resulting in cost savings.
- Initiated a program in conjunction with National Grid to conduct energy audits of all schools to assess alternatives that provide the shortest return on invested capital funds to achieve longer-term energy savings.
- Maintained minimum heating guidelines established by OSHA in all school buildings to assure efficiency, air quality and comfort.

School Food Service

- Refined and improved the automated point of sale system to offer discounted meals for parents/students who prepay for meals decreasing the time to serve meals.
- Staff received the Platinum award for excellent food preparation and service from Chartwells, the school food service provider.
- Continued to improve menu options by incorporating locally grown, fresh and healthy vegetables for students.
- Offered expanded a la carte items such as fruit smoothies and low fat yogurt.
- Published daily menus online and provided an opportunity for parents and students to submit feedback questionnaires to offer constructive suggestions to improve the program.

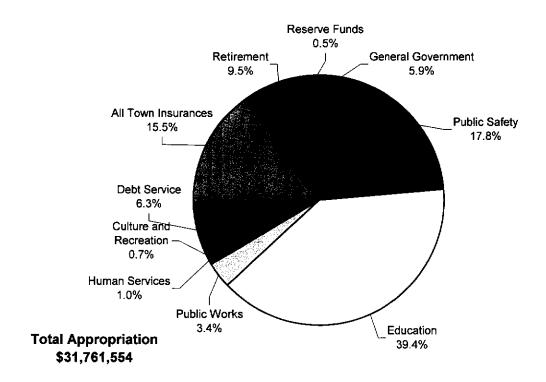

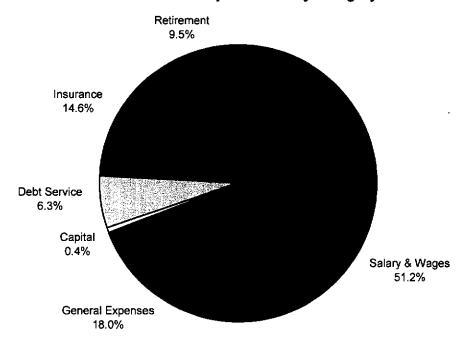

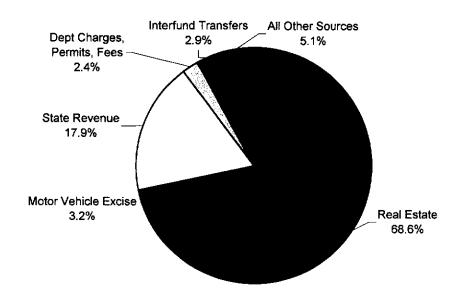


General Fund Expenditures by Category

The **Cherry Sheet**, named for the cherry colored paper on which it was originally printed, is the official notification to towns of the next fiscal year's state aid and assessments. The aid is in the form of distributions which provide funds based on formulas and reimbursements. The amount provided above is the gross amount, prior to the required assessment.

The purpose of the Cherry Sheet is to ensure that local budgets reflect realistic estimates if the amount of revenue a municipality will actually receive from the state during the upcoming year, as well as the amounts that will be assessed upon the local government to pay for state programs in which they participate.

Chapter 70 refers to the school funding formula created under the Education Reform Act of 1993 by which aid is distributed through the Cherry Sheet to help establish educational equity among municipal and regional school districts.

*Two receipt categories - School Lunch and Public Library, are designated as "Offset Items"

These amounts are funds that must be spent for the specific municipal programs.

Special Revenue Funds are established by statute, either a general law or a special act that applies to Hull, and contain revenues that are earmarked for, and restricted to, expenditures for specific purposes. Special Revenue funds include Gifts and Donations from private individuals or organizations, Receipts Reserved for Appropriation, authorized Revolving Funds, and Grants from governmental entities.

The School Lunch Program, under the direction of the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, receives reimbursement from the State and Federal governments for certain meal expenses. The State portion is reported with the Cherry Sheet receipts as an Offset Item and must be used for the School Lunch Program. The Hull Public Schools use the services of a food service management company to manage the food operation.

The Special Education Reimbursement Fund, or **Circuit Breaker**, was established in fiscal 2003 to provide additional state support to school districts for the costs of providing special education programs and services for students with disabilities. School districts are eligible for reimbursements for students with disabilities whose programs cost greater than four times the statewide foundation budget. By law, districts are reimbursed for 75% of the cost about this amount, subject to appropriation. In Fiscal 2011, Hull was reimbursed 43.66% of the net claim amount.

Trust Funds are defined as funds for money donated or transferred with specific instructions on its use. As custodian of trust funds, the treasurer invests and expends the funds as stipulated by the trust agreements, as directed by the commissioners of trust funds or by town meeting.

The **Stabilization Fund** is a fund designated to accumulate amounts for capital and other future spending purposes, although it may be appropriated for any lawful purpose. A two-thirds vote of town meeting is required for an appropriation into or out of the fund, or to alter the original purpose of the fund.

The May 2006 Annual Town Meeting established the Aid to the Elderly and Disabled Taxation Fund in accordance with MGL Chapter 60, section 3D. Donations to this fund assist the elderly and disabled residents defray real estate taxes. This ATM also established the Scholarship and Educational Funds in accordance with MGL Chapter 60, section 3C. A donation to the Scholarship Fund assists Hull residents for post secondary school or college, whereas a donation to the Educational Fund provides supplemental educational funding for educational needs.

The funds are distributed by committee consisting of Town officials and residents, as defined by statute.

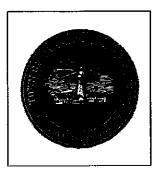

ANNUAL REPORT OF TOWN COUNSEL

January, 2012

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Hull:

In compliance with the provisions of the Code/By-laws of the Town, I respectfully submit my report as Town Counsel for 2011.

MISSION STATEMENT: It is the mission of the Town of Hull Law Department to serve the legal needs of the Town, its officials, employees, departments, boards, commissions and agencies. The goal is to provide the necessary legal advice and representation to facilitate the Town in carrying out its activities and duties in an efficient and legal manner.

This is accomplished by working with the various officials, employees, departments, boards, commissions and agencies of the Town. Such work includes meeting with them to discuss their projects and advising them on the legal issues involved. When necessary, it involves representing them in legal matters.

Additionally, much work is done in researching, drafting and reviewing the various legal documents, such as leases, licenses, decisions, opinions, advisories, contracts and other documents which arise during the day-to-day operation of the Town.

By working together in a cooperative fashion, the potential of claims is diminished and the various components of the Town are better able to serve the public, all for the benefit of our community, which is the ultimate mission of government.

In order to better understand the activities of the Law Department, the following brief explanation may be helpful.

The following is a list of cases, proceedings and claims involving the Town.

UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURT

1. Stilphen v. Hull, et al. This was a suit by a student of the high school over certain actions. The matter was turned over to the Town's insurance carrier. This office remained involved in the case working with the assigned counsel. The matter was removed to the U.S. District Court where it was resolved on terms favorable to the Town. (11)

APPEALS COURT

2. <u>Geno (Schindler), et al v. Hull Zoning Board of Appeals, et al.</u> This was an appeal from a decision of the Superior Court noted below uphold a decision of the Zoning Board of Appeals granting zoning relief to a property owner. The appeal was by an abutter. Briefs were submitted and the Appeals Court affirmed the decision of the Superior Court which had affirmed the Zoning Board of Appeals decision. (10)

SUPERIOR COURT

- 3. A&A Windows, Inc. v. BBC v. Town of Hull. This is a dispute over windows at the Memorial School as part of the School Renovation Project. The subcontractor has sued the general contractor, who has sued the Town. The Town paid the money in question into the Court which released the money to the subcontractor by agreement. Various claims remain before the Court.
- 4. <u>Brown v. Sweeney and Lucas</u>. This was the suit against a former police officer and a retired police officer alleging wrongful conduct which was remanded from the U.S. District Court. The matter was been referred to the Town's insurer and this office assisted the assigned counsel in the defense of the matter. The case was settled on terms favorable to the Town. (07)
- from a decision of the Zoning Board of Appeals. This was an appeal from a decision of the Zoning Board of Appeals granting zoning relief to a property owner. An abutter has appealed. While the obligation is on the property owner to defend the decision since the property owner obtained the zoning relief, the Town continues to be a party and monitors the case. Following motions filed in Court, the Court upheld the decision of the ZBA. The abutter appealed the matter to the Appeals Court, which as noted above upheld the decision of the ZBA. (08)
- 6. <u>Dell, Trustee v. Hull.</u> This is an appeal filed by an applicant for a lodging house license whose application was denied by the Board of Selectmen. (09)
- 7. <u>Slawsby, et al v. Hull Conservation Commission.</u> This is an appeal from enforcement orders of the Conservation Commission and for other relief relative to activities on the Town's dune system and beach area. The case is in the discovery phase. (10)
- 8. <u>Stilphen v. Hull, et al.</u> This was a suit by a student of the high school over certain actions. The matter was turned over to the Town's insurance carrier. This office remained involved in the case working with the assigned counsel. The matter was removed to the U.S. District Court where it was resolved on terms favorable to the Town. (11)

- 9. <u>Cope-Allen v. Hull, et all.</u> This is a suit by an employee against the Town and her supervisors alleging harassment and other claims. The matter has been turned over to the Town's insurance carrier. The plaintiff also sought certain preliminary orders which the Town opposed. Following a hearing, the Court denied those requests. The case is proceeding on its original claims (11)
- 10. <u>Cope-Allen v. Hull, et al.</u> This is a suit by an employee over the Town's response to her public records request.

LAND COURT

- 11. Petition of Bickoff. This is a petition to register a house lot and the beach lot across from it. The Town, along with the Commonwealth, has objected to the registration of the beach lot as requested by the Petitioner. The matter is pending in the Land Court. (10)
- 12. <u>Booras v. Hull Zoning Board of Appeals</u>. This is an appeal by a property owner from a decision of the Zoning Board of Appeals denying the applicants' request that the Board designate the property as a multi-family dwelling. The matter is pending in the Land Court. (10)
- 13. <u>Horne v. Zoning Board of Appeals.</u> This is an appeal by a person appealing a decision of the ZBA, which upheld a determination of the Building Commissioner denying a permit due to non-compliance with setback requirements. (11)
- 14. Conway v. Zoning Board of Appeals, et al. This is an appeal by an abutter to the granting of a variance permitting a party to build within the setback areas. While the burden of defending this grant of relief rests with the co-defendant who received the variance, this office remains involved in monitoring the case and assisting in upho0lding the decision of the ZBA. (11)

DISTRICT COURT

- 15. <u>Island View Condominium Association v. Tesorero, et al.</u> This is an action by a condominium association against a unit owner for fees owed. As required by law, the Town is a nominal party as the Town is due taxes on the unit. (09)
- 16. Nardo v. West. This initially was a suit between a home owner and a contractor and the contractor sought to bring the Town into the matter as a stakeholder of certain funds claimed by the contractor but disputed by the home owner. The Town opposed being made a party to the suit as a stakeholder. The Court took no action on the request that the Town be included as a stakeholder. Eventually the contractor amended the suit to include a direct claim against the Town and another party and the home owner on a conspiracy theory. The Town opposed this and filed a motion to dismiss the claim against it, which was heard by the Court in December. A decision was issued granting the Town's motion. The Town paid the funds it was holding into the Court. Various attempts by the contractor to bring the Town back into the case as a party were opposed and denied by the Court. The matter went to trial between the original parties. Various employees of the Town testified at trial. A judgment was issued which did not affect the Town. (10)

17. Town of Hull v. Patterson. This is a tax collection suit by the Town against an owner of four properties in Town who has not paid taxes on the properties for several years. In addition, one of the properties has fire code violations and the Town sought Court orders for the property to be brought into compliance. The suit followed repeated unsuccessful attempts to get the property owner to comply with the law. The matter is pending in Court. (10)

HOUSING COURT

18. Town of Hull v. Kehoe, et al. This is a code enforcement action filed by the Town against the owners and manager of rental property which was found not to be in compliance with code requirements. Various hearings were held in the Housing Court, resulting in orders against the defendants to make repairs. When the defendants did not make the repairs, the Town sought to have a Receiver appointed to take control of the property. That request was pending at the end of the year. (11)

ADMINISTRATIVE HEARINGS, PROCEEDINGS AND MISCELLANEOUS CLAIMS AND MATTERS

- 19. <u>DEP and the Town of Hull.</u> This is a claim by the state over beach maintenance activities. The Town is working with the state in an effort to resolve the matter. (06)
- 20. S. Tarushka. This is a claim for injuries resulting from a medical call. (08)
- 21. A. Page. This is a claim for injuries resulting from a police call. (08)
- 22. Aquarium Water Company. This is a petition by the local water utility to increase its rates, filed with the state Department of Public Utilities. The Town is working closely with the other communities involved in this petition, Cohasset and Hingham and Millbury and Oxford, to strongly oppose it. Discovery in these matters is extensive and fast tracked. Numerous hearings were held and a decision was issued in 2009. The decision from the DPU granted much, but not all, of the rate adjustments sought by the Company. Various orders were issued against the Company. One of the communities involved in the matter has filed further proceedings concerning the water service in that community and the rates approved in this case. The DPU issued further orders to the Company. There are still outstanding issues arising from the filings of Oxford which are pending resolution by the DPU. (08)
- 23. <u>Aquarian Water Company.</u> A group of residents filed for a hearing over certain quality of service issues. The Town intervened in the matter. Following a series of information requests issued by the DPU and responded to by the Company, briefs have been filed and a decision is due from the DPU. (09)
- 24. R. Alhquist. This was a grievance filed over a personnel issue. The grievance was denied on the local level. (09) An appeal for arbitration was filed, hearings held and the matter is awaiting the arbitration decision. (10)
- 25. <u>In Re; Wm. Horne</u>. This is an appeal for an adjudicatory hearing before the Department of Environmental Protection following the regional DEP office issuing a Supperceding Order of Conditions upholding the denial by the

- Conservation Commission of a project to build a house on a particular lot in the Rockaway Annex section. The petitioner withdrew the appeal. (10)
- 26. P. Burke/Liberty Mutual Insurance Company. This is a subrogation claim regarding alleged damage to a boat. The Town is working with the insurer on the matter. (10)
- 27. <u>Hull Teachers Associations</u>. This is an unfair labor practice charge filed at the state Division of Labor Relations by the teachers' union over health insurance issues concerning retiree benefits. The matter is pending. The matter is expected to go forward at a hearing in 2012. (10)
- 28. <u>Hull Teachers Association-Paraprofessionals.</u> This is an unfair labor practice charge filed at the state Division of Labor Relations by the paraprofessionals over health insurance issues concerning retiree benefits. The matter is pending. The matter is expected to go forward at a hearing in 2012. (10)
- 29. <u>Hull Teachers Associations</u>. This is an unfair labor practice charge filed at the state Division of Labor Relations by the teachers' union over health insurance issues concerning co-pays. The matter is pending. The matter is expected to go forward at a hearing in 2012. (10)
- 30. <u>Hull Teachers Association-Paraprofessionals.</u> This is an unfair labor practice charge filed at the state Division of Labor Relations by the paraprofessionals over health insurance issues concerning co-pays. The matter is pending. The matter is expected to go forward at a hearing in 2012. (10)
- 31. <u>B. Smith.</u> This was a local level personnel hearing. The decision was appealed to arbitration but eventually not processed. (10)
- 32. B. Smith. This is an appeal for unemployment benefits by a former employee. The adjudicator denied the claim for benefits and the claimant appealed it for a hearing. At the hearing, the Review Examiner found for the employee and ordered benefits to be paid. The Town appealed that decision to the Board of Review which accepted the Town's appeal and subsequently ruled in favor of the Town, upholding the original decision that the claimant was not entitled to benefits. (10)
- 33. <u>W. Dunn</u>. This is a claim on behalf of a child for alleged injuries at a school event. The Town is working with the insurer. (10)
- 34. <u>I. Braga</u>. This is a subordination negligence claim against the Town arising out of an accident with a Town Vehicle. The Town is working with the insurer. (10)
- 35. Horne and the Department of Environmental Protection, et al. This matter involves various appeals by an applicant for an Order of Conditions and an abutter relative to a proposed single family home in an environmentally sensitive area. DEP eventually approved the project. (10)
- 36. R. Graves. This is a street defect claim for personal injuries. (11)
- 37. <u>In Re Schindler and the Department of Environmental Protection.</u> This matter involved initially an appeal by residents appealing a decision of the Conservation

. . .

Commission in granting an Order of Conditions permitting a fence to be installed which would cut off the access to a beach area. Following the region upholding the Order, the residents and the Town filed separate appeals to the adjudicatory division of DEP. Pre-Hearing conferences and discovery were held. A day long evidentiary hearing was held and post hearing briefs submitted. The decision allowed the fence but imposed other requirements. The Town is considering an appeal of the decision. (11)

- 38. Aquarium Water Company. This is a petition by the local water utility to increase its rates, filed with the state Department of Public Utilities. The Town is working closely with the other communities involved in this petition, Cohasset and Hingham and Oxford, to strongly oppose it. Discovery in these matters is extensive and fast tracked. Following discovery and other procedural matters, five days of evidentiary hearings were held. Briefs are due to be submitted in January and a decision is expected by April 1, 2012. (11)
- 39. Aquarium Water Company. This is a petition by the local water utility for approval to engage in certain re-financing, filed with the state Department of Public Utilities. The Town is working closely with the other communities involved in this petition, Cohasset and Hingham and Oxford, to strongly oppose it. Discovery in these matters is extensive and fast tracked. Following discovery and other procedural matters, an evidentiary hearing was held. Briefs were submitted and the DPU allowed the re-financing. This relates in part to the rate increase case above. (11)
- 40. <u>Kaplan and the Hull Zoning Board of Appeals.</u> This is an appeal of actions of purported actions of the Building Commissioner, Board of Selectmen, Town Manager and Town Counsel. It is pending before the ZBA. (11)
- 41. <u>Costello and the Hull Zoning Board of Appeals.</u> This is an appeal from orders of the Building Commissioner to a property owner. It is pending before the ZBA. (11)

Other work performed included the drafting of various and numerous opinions, leases, contracts, reports, official documents, town meeting warrants and motions, and other documents. This is in addition to the numerous consultations with various employees and officials for legal advice and assistance.

In addition, numerous legal advisories were issued and/or written for Boards and officials and administrative decisions were drafted for Boards and officials based on their decisions.

Personnel matters continue to be a major focus of this offices work with other Town Departments and officials. Town Counsel worked closely with the Board of Selectmen, the Town Manager, the School Department and other officials as they dealt with various personnel and grievance matters. The Town is a service provider and services are provided by the many Town employees and officials. Thus, there are a number of employment issues which arise during the course of the year involving the need for services from the Law Department. Both the state and federal government enact new laws with which the Town must comply.

This office also worked with various Town Departments and employees in dealing with subpoenas and requests from third parties for employees or officials to appear at legal proceedings and/or produce Town documents.

Town Counsel also represented the Town at various hearings and meeting at the state level on matters concerning the Town.

The local water company and its petitions to the state Department of Public Utilities consumed significant time this year. There was a petition for approval to do certain re-financing that would affect the operations in this area. More significantly, there was yet again another significant rate increase petition filed. These cases involve detailed review of documents, discovery requests and responses, and research, all leading up to hearings which require further preparation. Hearings were held in both matters. Hull worked in a cooperative fashion with our neighbors Hingham and Cohasset and also with the Town of Oxford (which is serviced by the same company out of a separate water distribution system). It can be expected that the company will continue to file such petitions on a regular basis.

In addition, the Law Department has been involved in working with other employees and officials in numerous other matters affecting the Town, including public improvement projects and the implementation of various laws and programs. As in the past, matters concerning the beach and various claims required significant time.

Code enforcement was an area that saw increased activity this past year. This involved in dealing with properties that were in financial distress and taken over by the lender, as well as other properties that were not in compliance with the law. Under the task force/working group of various local departments involved in code enforcement, many problem properties have been addressed. The task force continues to work on various code compliance issues. Not only does this provide for better housing for residents of the Town, but it also makes the Town more attractive and improves property values.

Town Counsel continues to meet and work with Town Boards, departments, officials and employees in the day-to-day activities and special projects undertaken. This cooperative effort leads to the effective administration of the Town, and has resulted in the resolution of many matters in the public's interest. Some of the examples include non-criminal disposition procedure, dune matters, public safety programs, municipal operations, development issues and other matters. Various training programs and meetings have been presented to boards and employees to assist them in carrying out their mission in a legal manner. For example, in 2010 major changes to the Open Meeting Law became effective. Training programs on complying with the new law were presented three times. Many boards have sought out advice on particular meeting issues. Because of the changes in the law, more questions concerning compliance issues have occurred and needed to be addressed. The fact that such questions are being raised is a positive thing, as it shows the continued efforts of local officials and employees to comply with this important law.

The overshadowing issue this past year, and likely to continue into the next several years, is the budget and how the Town will continue to provide necessary and needed services with a reduction in revenue. All departments and employees, along with many members of the public, are working to try to address this dilemma. This Department continues to work with all to find effective, efficient and fiscally sound ways to provide necessary services to the Town.

Although the list of cases and matters above appears high (and reflects a trend experienced elsewhere), the ongoing cooperation between the officials and employees of the Town has resulted in fewer claims actually being filed against the Town than might otherwise be the case. In addition, the cooperative effort and the hard work of many of your employees and officials have resulted in numerous decisions and resolutions favorable to the Town. Much of the work of this Department is educational in providing the proper and legal tools for the various Town Departments to do carry out their mission in an efficient and legal manner. I can not

emphasize enough how important it is to meet with these various Town officials and employees and work with them in a collaborative effort so that the numerous tasks undertaken by the Town are done in a legally sound manner. This has greatly reduced claims and has enabled your officials and employees to be better trained to perform their many tasks.

Working with various other employees, the renewal process of the Town's insurance has resulted in fairly good coverage for the Town. The insurance market, particular for municipalities, is a very tight market. Working with our insurance advisor at Richardson Insurance, both in handling claims and in the rather involved renewal process, the Town has been able to retain appropriate coverage. Numerous documents, requiring research and preparation of forms, had to be provided to the insurance carrier for this to take place. In a continued effort to control costs and claims, this office remains involved in risk management for the Town.

If there are any questions regarding the Town's legal affairs, I remain available to discuss the same, to the extent that it is appropriate. Much misinformation can be avoided if people make inquiry on matters.

Appreciation is expressed for the cooperation and assistance of the various Town departments, officials and employees, particularly the members of the Honorable Board of Selectmen during the past year, John D. Reilly, Jr., Dr. Christopher Olivieri, Domenico Sestito, John Brannan, Kevin P. Richardson, former Selectman Dennis Blackall and Town Manager Philip E. Lemnios, Office Manager and Town Clerk Janet Bennett, Clerk to the Board of Selectmen Terri Finneran, Administrative Assistant to the Town Manager Nancy Allen, Selectmen's Recording Secretary Susan Turner as well as the many members of the public who have assisted in various matters.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Hull:

The Department of Veterans' Services submits for your consideration its annual report ending December 31, 2011.

Your Hull Department of Veterans' Services continues to provide quality service to the town's Veterans, widows and dependents in accordance with Massachusetts General Law Chapter 115. This law was established in 1861 and provides eligible Massachusetts recipients access to federal, state and local Veterans' benefits and services.

Local/State Benefits: In 2011, the average number of monthly claims for financial and medical assistance was 38 with an annual town expenditure of \$332,000.00; expected reimbursement from the Commonwealth to the town is \$249,000.00 (75%).

Federal Benefits: In 2011, 187 Hull Veterans, widows and dependents received \$199,827.00 in service-connected disability and pension federal compensation.

Case Management: In 2011, the average number of monthly cases requiring social service assistance was 35. The number of Iraq/Afghanistan (OIF/OEF) Hull Veterans is 42 and they have received the Commonwealth's Welcome Home Bonus.

Your Hull Department of Veterans' Services will focus on strengthening operations and service delivery to Hull's Veteran community; working with federal, state and municipal partners and organizations to increase the efficiency of providing benefits. Every day is Veteran's Day in the Town of Hull and we will strive to support that mission.

At this time, we would like to thank all town agencies and elected officials for their continuing support of Veterans and special kudos to Hull's Interim Veterans Service Officer Mr. Thomas Tullie for his extraordinary performance in 2010-2011.
