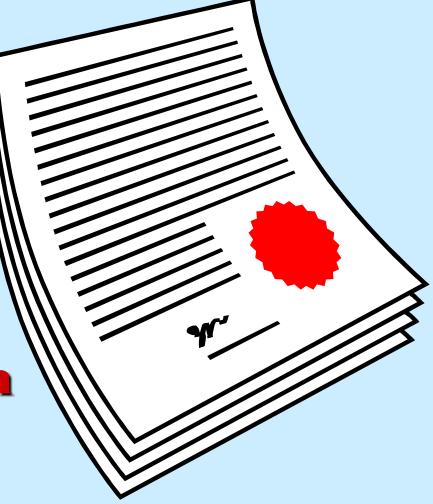

Hull Public Schools (HPS) Special Education Budget

Purpose of the presentation is to provide an overview of:

- the special education process,
- the components that drive the budgetary needs, and
- why the budget fluctuates.

## Why Special Education?

- It is a legal and mandated obligation for all school districts.
- Schools must provide a Free and Appropriate Public Education (F.A.P.E.) to all students.
- Governed by Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act of 2004 (IDEA) and closely tied to No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB).
- Governed by MA General Law Ch. 71 B and by the MA Regulations under 603 CMR 28.

#### **Special Education Process**

Team process to meet the needs of students with disabilities beginning at age 2.9 and ending at age 22 that consists of the following steps:

- Referral for an evaluation due to a suspected disability
- Receive signed consent from parent/guardian for an evaluation
- Complete testing
- Hold a team meeting/determine eligibility
- Develop an Individual Education Program (IEP) upon eligibility (formally written by liaison and mailed to parents)
- Receive signed consent to implement the IEP
- Hold annual Team meetings to update IEP
- Reevaluate every three years

## Special Education Process (cont.)

- The 10 disability categories that are recognized in education include:
  - Autism
  - Developmental Delay
  - Intellectual
  - Sensory
  - Neurological
  - Emotional
  - Communication
  - Physical
  - Specific Learning
  - Health

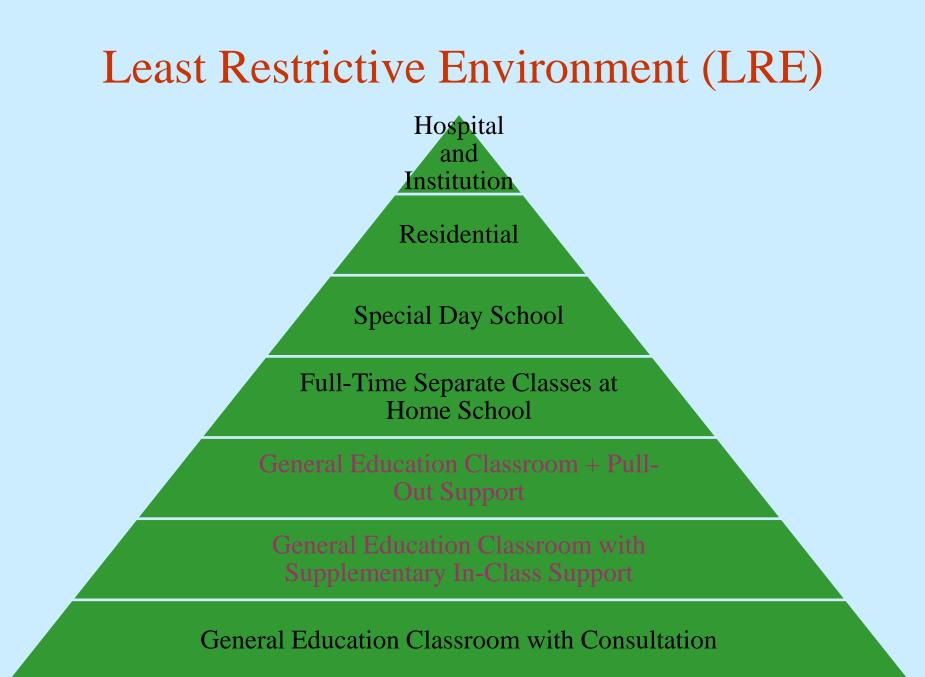
## Special Education Process (cont.)

- At times the Team will reconvene for other reasons:
  - IEP goals are not on track for being met or have been exceeded
  - Additional services are determined to be needed
  - Student is not making progress in school
  - During transition from building to building or program to program

After a reconvene meeting, the IEP is often revised or amended.

#### Individual Education Programs (IEPs)

- Goal-oriented services are written into the IEP as agreed upon by the Team.
- Services include OT, PT, Speech Therapy, Counseling, O&M, TVI, etc.
- Services may be delivered as consultation or as direct services within the general education classrooms, in a small group pull-out setting, or an individual pull-out setting.
- At Team meetings, based on goals and services, the Team determines a placement in the Least Restrictive Environment, (LRE).

### **HPS** Initial Evaluations

• In FY16 there were a total of 61 initial referrals to special education.

• Of the initial referrals made in FY16, 44% were found eligible for special education.

#### **HPS** Reevaluations

• In FY16 there were a total of 57 reevaluations.

• Of the reevaluations in FY16, 65% were found eligible for special education.

#### **Special Education Transportation**

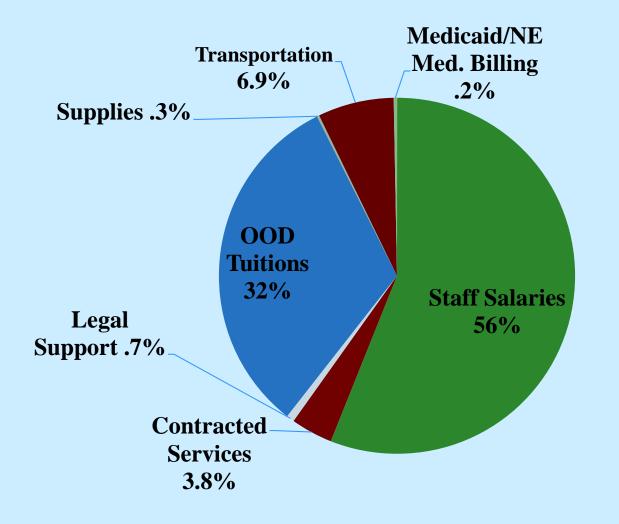
• HPS is required to provide transportation to OOD students as well as some students attending Hull programs, based on their disability.

• There are no reimbursement or grant programs to subsidize transportation costs.

## OOD Costs Tuition & Transportation

- Even though the number of students in OOD placements may be the same or less, the cost to the district may be higher.
- Why?
  - Tuitions rage from ~\$30,000 to ~\$139,000,
    depending on the placement.
  - Transportation ranges from ~\$15/student/day to
    \$250/student/day.
  - If only one student is attending a program located in a separate setting, there is a high cost per student.

# What are the Components of the Special Education Budget?



#### **Special Education Budget Fluctuates**

- **Budget is not "set"** like most programs. HPS is <u>legally obligated</u> to provide required services and services fluctuate for individual students over the course of a year. For that reason, the budget required for services also fluctuates.
- Example 1: New student with an IEP moves in, after budget is set, system must provide the services the IEP states.
- Example 2: Student is not making effective progress in current placement and the Team determines the need for a more restrictive placement.

## Prediction of OOD Tuition for FY18

- Principals, Assistant Principals and Director of Student Services meet regularly with staff to discuss interventions for students at risk for OOD placements.
- Assistant Superintendent, Director of Student Services and OOD Coordinator meet regularly to review OOD student progress.

## Prediction of OOD Tuition for FY18

- OOD Coordinator and Director of Student Services work closely with placement setting to ensure quality programming and assess readiness to return to HPS.
- 28% of current students in OOD settings were placed out of district within a year from the time they moved to Hull. We cannot predict what the needs are of the students who will move into the district.

#### How Can HPS Keep Costs Lower?

- Create/Strengthen Programs in HPS:
  - Response to Intervention Program (RTI)
  - Continue to build a strong collaboration between general education staff and support staff.
- In-District Specialized Programs:
  - Team Based Learning (TBL)
  - Teaching Independence and Decision Making through Educational Support (TIDES)
  - Satellite Program
